Program: Virtual Stroll of the National Mall

Our program was a virtual lunchtime stroll of the National

Mall with Laura Moore, a registered member of the Guild of Professional Tour Guides of Washington D.C.. Laura is from Claremont and is a graduate of the CHS class of '83. She went on to Columbia University, received her PhD at the University of Georgia and now teaches US History at George Mason University in Virginia.

Laura consolidated her nor-

mal four-hour walking tour of the National Mall into a 30 minute virtual tour for us today. Armed with an excellent PowerPoint and mouse pointer she walked us virtually through a series of maps and photos giving us an overview of the history of the mall, hit the major memorials and talked about the newer memorials and those in the works.

We started with some "before now" pictures of her usual 8th grade class tours including a packed mall that usually has thousands of people walking around. Then we jumped back in time and saw how the land developed back when the Washington Monument was completed in 1885. Much of

the land was created out of mud from the Potomac River in 1912.

In 1923 the Lincoln Memorial was built and by 1947 the Pentagon and Jefferson Memorial had been built. By 1984 we had the John F. Kennedy Memorial and Vietnam War Memorial.

Our virtual tour started at the WWII memorial, traveling on to the Vietnam, Lincoln and Korea memorials. Then on to the MLK, Jr and FDR memorials before concluding at the Jefferson memorial.

Laura gave us a few tidbits that may not be noticed at each memorial if not with a professional guide. At the WWII memorial Laura showed us a small "Kilroy was here" engraving, a joke from the "greatest generation."

ROTARY, THE ZOOM MEETING

President Buff shared a slide from a <u>video</u> prepared by Rotary International, featuring RI President Holger Knaack and RI Foundation Trustee Chair K. R. Ravindran. ganizers, and they thought my shop made for a good story, so we ended up on the cover page of the Apparel News." What a salesman! Now that's a fine tale.



At the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, the wall lists 58,300 who were either killed in action or missing in service, which most of us have seen—at least in pictures. The soldiers are listed in chronological order by the date of their death. Laura pointed out a relatively new plaque honoring those who died later as a result of their service, as from Agent Orange or PTSD. (at right)

At the Korean Memorial (shown at right), which was built after the Vietnam Memorial, there is a wall of faces from real photographs of people who served, engraved into granite. It also includes the picture of a dog who served in Korea along with his handler.

Laura talked about the Lincoln Memorial, sharing many stories about this meaningful place, looking out at the Washington Memorial. This has been a stage of



democracy since the 1922 dedication when Lincoln's only surviving child, Robert Todd Lincoln, was present and captured on film before passing four years later. (photo, above right)

There is a plaque where the podium was when MLK gave his "I Have a Dream" speech, dedicated 40 years after the

March on Washington. Laura showed us many historical photos from the Lincoln Memorial including a white park ranger standing next to MLK during his historic 1963 speech. The ranger, Cornelius Heine, just died on March 11th of this year. We then moved on to the MLK Memorial featuring the sculpture by artist Lei Yixin, dedicated in 2011. The design was based on

the metaphor "out of mountain of despair, a stone of hope." MLK's carving faces the Lincoln Memorial.

We went on to the FDR Memorial after passing the Tidal Basin and an active beach that was once closed rather than be desegregated.

The FDR Memorial is segmented into four sections reflecting his four terms in office. The first section depicts a bread line, particularly meaningful now, and the second covers WWII. The third section depicts the Yalta Conference in 1945. FDR's sculpture actually features the wheels of FDRs chair. You have



to go to back of statue to see, but the detail is there. The fourth area is about FDR's funeral.

On our way to the Jefferson Memorial, the Inlet Bridge features a fish sculpture with a face in tribute to after National Park Service employee Manus "Jack" Fish.



Finally, at the Jefferson Memorial, Laura noted that you can see the White House, which was by design. FDR was a big proponent of the Jefferson Memorial and laid the cornerstone for it in 1939. He wanted a direct view from the White House to remember the founding ideals of the nation.

Bonus memorials! Did you know there is a Grant Memorial, Japanese-American Memorial, Peace Corps Memorial, Native American Veterans Memorial, Eisenhower Memorial and Disabled Veterans Memorial? Plus, under construction is a new National WWI Memorial in addition to temporary memorials like "The Poppy Wall," "Holocaust Survivors," "Veterans for Peace" and more recently, "COVID memorials." Temporary memorials are often only up for a few weeks.

Laura kept much of her audience well after time with a fascinating Q&A and even those very familiar with the National Mall learned much today. (Laura's mother Linda, a resident of Claremont, was lurking in background during the presentation, and asked a few questions at the end!) Of course, because she is a history professor, Laura left us with a reading list if you wish to learn more!



Speaker Clem Sunter is South Africa's most highly regarded scenario planner and strategist. He is an icon and model of mental litheness and has been expertly styled as the Foxy Futurist. He is an executive elite who was responsible for the scenario planning unit of Anglo American

in the 1980s and operated as its CEO in the 1990s. He has found a calling in mounting unique and creative solutions to fit circumstances no longer defined in a box. He has given presentations globally and has become an ambassador of expert knowledge for South Africa.

From discussing strategy in the 1980s with our former president, Nelson Mandela, to becoming a renowned author of several best-selling books, and rooted in bringing his new methodology to the people.

The two main scenarios Clem will be talking about are 'The gilded cage' (do we remain a divided planet) or a 'Friendly planet' (joining together to ensure a better future). He will also be talking about the 'Economic Crossroad' that SA faces, as to whether those responsible take the 'high road or low road'.

Mr. Sunter is dually known for his book, The Mind of a Fox, which indicated the terrorist attacks on US soil on September 11, 2001.


And brought to you by Rotary in Great Britain and Ireland: TogetherTalks. New talks will be scheduled soon.

As of April 15, all people over 16 are eligible


Vaccine supply is still an issue.
