#### Guest Speaker: Dr. Joshua B. Fisher

#### Topic: "Climate"

#### Introducer: Diana Peterson-More



Dr. Joshua B. Fisher is a Scientist at the Joint Institute for Regional Earth System Science and Engineering at UCLA, and at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory at Caltech. His work focuses on terrestrial ecosystems, water, carbon, and nutrient cycling using a combination of supercomputer models, satellite and airborne remote sensing, and field campaigns throughout the Amazon to the Arctic. Dr. Fisher is originally from Los Angeles, received his undergraduate and graduate degrees from UC Berkeley, and did his postdoctoral work from the University of Oxford, where he also taught

for a few years before coming back to LA.

Climate change is a hot topic, but what is climate, and how does something long-term impact us in the short-term? This presentation goes through some of the basic science of climate.

Judge Darrell Mavis, **President Mary Lou's** boss, is Supervising Judge of the Northeast and North Central Judicial Districts of the Los Angeles Superior Court which include the Pasadena, Burbank, Glendale and Alhambra courthouses. In high school, he participated in a Rotary Four Way Speech Contest. He noted that it wasn't really possible to be **Mary Lou's** boss. There are 500 judicial officers on LA Superior Court and Pasadena is the most popular location to be a bench officer.

The topic was Thinking about Thinking. How do judges make decisions? How do people make decisions? He started us off with a quiz. If you were there, these are the questions to ask your friends and relatives. If you weren't, play along now. Answers will be at the end of the column.

A bat and a ball \$1.10. The bat cost a \$1 more than the ball. How much does the ball cost?

If it takes 5 machines 5 minutes to make 5 widgets, how long will it take 100 machines to make 100 widgets?

In a lake, a patch of lily pads takes a day to double in size. If it takes 48 days to cover the lake, how long will it take to cover half the lake?

If you missed one or more, you're not unusual. The same test was given to different groups of people. (You can see <u>a picture of the chart</u> on the Pasadena Rotary Facebook page). MIT students got an average of 2.18 correct. Florida State judges got an average of 1.23 correct. Interestingly enough, how many you get correct isn't correlated with intelligence.

The test illustrates the Intuitive Mind v. Deductive Mind. The intuitive mind is spontaneous, effortless and fast, gut feelings. It is often correct but often not. A more deliberative process might override that original answer. On the other hand, the logical, deductive mind might want to just rubber stamp the intuitive answer.

When is the Intuitive mind wrong? How would you correct that?

The intuitive mind doesn't see things that it isn't looking for. We watched a video to demonstrate this. To play along at home, the video is <u>here.</u>

The intuitive mind reacts to how a question is asked. Organ donations are higher in countries where you have to opt out than in countries where you have to opt in. Intuitive mind likes the

easier answer --where you don't have to do anything.

Intuitive mind latches on to recent information, even if it irrelevant. That's called anchoring. The intuitive mind also reacts to priming - when the questioner sets up an expectation.

The remedy is awareness. Are you reacting to the right information?

Anthony Shapiro as Sergeant at Arms took the mike out into the audience. Jim Osterling, Marsha Rood, Marshall Fuss and Don Andrues asked questions.

President Mary Lou sent us off with Go Out There and Be the Inspiration.

Answers:

The fun thing about this quiz is that each question has an intuitive answer, which is wrong (ten cents, 100 minutes, 24 days). Here are the correct answers:

Five cents. The bat cost \$1.05 which is a dollar more. If you answered 10 cents, you are not alone. Many people got that answer.

5 minutes. Each machine takes the same amount of time to make a widget.

47 days. Between day 47 and day 48, it doubled from half the lake to the entire lake.
