

In Memoriam Al Lowe (1926-2018)

Remarks by **John Cushman** Pasadena Rotary Meeting of November 28, 2018



Rotary Past President, and longest serving member, Al Lowe has died at the ripe old age of 92 in Castro Valley. He is survived by his wife, Rose Marie and four children. He was only 36 years old when he served as Rotary president. He and Rose Marie moved to Hayward in 2000 to be closer to his children and grandchildren. For the last 15 years, Al has visited Pasadena Rotary annually.

Al was a fourth generation American of Chinese descent. His dad had a small oriental curio shop in Pasadena which Al took over at his dad's death in 1952. Al grew that small business into an Interior Design store in East Pasadena. He was a very successful businessman and as such became a major force in our community. His personal talents of working with others helped to make Pasadena great in so many ways.

He served with distinction on many boards such as the Pasadena YWCA, United Way,

Chamber of Commerce, Pasadena Beautiful and Urban Commission.

His most well-known activities though were The Pasadena School Board, The Pasadena Playhouse and the Tournament of Roses.

Al was not afraid to stand up for what he thought was right.

He was Chair of the Pasadena School Board in 1969. This was a tumultuous time in our city's history. He joined the majority of the board in not challenging Federal Judge Manny Real's ruling to institute forced busing of school kids to achieve racial balance. He was true to his own convictions knowing that he would be both applauded and vilified for his actions. He did what his conscience told him to do.

Al, in the early 90s entered leadership of the Board of the Pasadena Playhouse just when it was teetering on the edge of bankruptcy. He was determined to save the Playhouse, an old Pasadena asset and institution steeped in the city's culture. He personally loaned money, raised outside funds and for the time saved the venerable Pasadena landmark.

He was a long-time member of the Tournament of Roses and his daughter was a Rose Princess in 1969. In 1994 he was made Chairman of the Membership Development Committee, and in that capacity, he helped the tournament change from an "exclusive" organization to the "inclusive" one that it is today. Here AI showed his skill at successfully bringing people together to work for the common good.

Above all, AI was an optimistic man. On the day he died he was executing stock options. Buying futures!

Al was the complete human being. Was he a liberal visionary? Yes. Was he a conservative traditionalist? Yes. Did he practice the Four Way Test? Yes. Was he the complete American? Yes. As Larry Wilson said in ending his <u>piece on Al</u>, "Teach your children to be like him."

Chuck Carroll, Elaine Silberman, **Mary Chalon** and **Tony Shapiro** took the stage to announce the Toys for Tots drive. There will be a box in the lobby. Bring unwrapped toys and sporting goods for children from infants up to 15 years old. Gift cards are also accepted. Price range is \$25-50. You can bring the toys to the Christmas party or the Rotary meetings on the 12th and 19th.

Past President Diana Peterson-More is on the board of the Tournament of Roses Foundation, which has given a grant to the Pasadena Senior Citizens Center (Pasadena Rotarian **Akila Gibbs** is the Senior Center's Executive Director). **Diana** has 4 extra tickets to Zoo Lights. Tickets are valued at 25 dollars each. You can have them for (4) \$20 donations to the TOR Foundation.

Diana also announced that, starting January 1, employers of 5 or more people are required to provide sexual harassment training. On December 5, **Diana** is providing it at Pasadena Media offices from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. **Diana** donated \$100 to Polio Pig for the privilege of proffering so many announcements.

Scott Jenkins introduced our speaker, David Eads, who is Executive Director and CEO of the Tournament of Roses. The first black President of the TOR, Gerald Freeny, will be our speaker after the parade.

This is the 130th Rose Parade and the 105th Rose Bowl. The theme is The Melody of Life and the Grand Marshal is Chaka Khan. Disney star and Dancing with the Stars champion Jordan Fisher will perform in the opening show.

The parade started in 1890 with floats drawn by horses. The first motorized floats were in 1920. It has never been canceled. Only a few thousand attended in 1890 and that parade featured things like foot races and chariot races.

In the 1920s, both men and women were included in the Royal Court and there is some discussion of doing that again. The TOR is launching a Youth Empowerment Day in April.

TOR has 935 volunteers who put in a collective 80,000 hours each year.

The Rose Parade is the oldest and largest floral parade and it has a \$350 million dollar economic impact. There are 700,000 attendees, 6000 participants, 22 bands, 18 equestrian units and 26 floats. In addition, the parade is viewed by 28 million viewers in 200 countries. There are 6 television broadcast partners and digital streaming through the Rose Bowl app. The Rose Bowl app will be available the second week of December.

There are a lot of challenges for the future. TV ratings are down and the viewership is older, impacting how much sponsors would be willing to pay. There are security concerns. TOR works closely with law enforcement on counter-terrorism activities. There are increasing concerns about the safety of tackle football ban for young people.

There are many accompanying events - Equestfest, Bandfest, float decorating opportunities, Rose Bowl Hall of Fame, and post-parade float viewing. 80,000 people show up for post parade float viewing over a day and a half. The goal is to have something to do all the time from Dec 26-Jan 3. Last year, they began the Rose Bowl Bash in downtown Los Angeles, where the bands all stay. Last year, 10,000 people attended in a 3 hour period. This year, the Rose Bowl Bash will have 2 days of events.

This year, TOR is introducing <u>Sip and Savor</u> in the Arroyo on December 28, 29 and 30.

Fred Soldwedel and Phil Hawkey asked questions.

President Mary Lou reminded us that there is no lunch next week. As she told us,"You are rocking it, Pasadena Rotary. Go out there and continue to Be the Inspiration!"
