



Here's something new. At the Cleveland Convention a new type of membership was decided upon called "Senior Member".

"Any Active member of a Rotary Club who now is and has been an active member of one or more Rotary Clubs for a total of twenty or more years, or who is of the age of sixty-five or more after having been an active member of one or more Rotary clubs for a total of five or more gears, may, at his option, become a senior member of said club by notifying the secretary thereof in writing of his intention so to do."

This means that the Senior Member shall continue with all the responsibilities in the Club but he will not represent any business or professional classification. The former classification will be open to membership for someone else qualifying.

It is hardly thought that any members will avail themselves of this new membership as a member in Rotary usually has pride in his classification. It would be, however, an unselfish thing to do for the good of the Club, allowing a younger man to have the classification rather than to lose that younger man to membership in some other club. Of course, if the clder member completely gave up his business or profession, he could still become a Past Service Member.


