Guest Speaker: **R. Scott Jenkins**, Chair, Rose Bowl Management Committee

Topic: The Granddaddy of Them All

Professionally, **Scott Jenkins** is a Partner and former Managing Partner with Hahn & Hahn Lawyers in Pasadena, practicing corporate and real estate law.

Scott was born and raised in Pasadena, received his A.B. in Economics from the University of California, Berkeley, with honors, and earned his J.D. from the University of Southern California, where is served as Executive Managing Editor of the Southern California Law Review.

Scott is currently Chair of the Rose Bowl Management Committee, which is the governing body among the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Association, the Pac-12 Conference, and the Big Ten Conference, with responsibility for organizing each year the Rose Bowl Game. He served as President for the 2014 Tournament of Roses, overseeing the 125th Rose Parade and the 100th Rose Bowl Game. He has volunteered with the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Association since 1982, and is a Lifetime Director.

In addition to **Scott's** many years of service with the Tournament of Roses, he has been involved with numerous community organizations. He is currently a Director of Huntington Memorial Hospital, and a Director of Forest Lawn Memorial-Parks and Mortuaries. **Scott** has been a member of Pasadena Rotary since 1986. He recently concluded 17 years of service as General Counsel of the Western Justice Center Foundation. He has also served as President of the San Marino Unified School District, President of the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank, President of the San Marino Schools Foundation, President of the San Marino Community Church Foundation, and Elder at the San Marino Community Church.

In 2017, the Pasadena Senior Center honored **Scott** for his community service at its annual Zest Gala. In 2003, he was recognized with the Golden Apple Award from the San Marino Unified School District. In 2002, Scott received the San Marino Citizen of the Year award for his contributions to the community.

**Scott** and his wife Cindy have two grown daughters, Courtney and Lindsay, and a granddaughter, Addie Rose.



Pasadena Rotary, thank you all for participating so enthusiastically in our impromptu Rotary Education session about the Object of Rotary this week! Kudos to **Debbie Loveland** and **Leah Snell** for having their Object of Rotary cards on their persons! For those of you who've misplaced yours, let me know - I have a few more on a first-come, first-serve basis! Or you can check out a great, short discussion of the Object of Rotary <a href="https://example.com/here/">here</a>!

I wonder how many of you know where the Object of Rotary comes from? I sure didn't until I did a little digging. Turns out it's from Article 4 of the Constitution of Rotary International and you can download it for yourself right <a href="here">here</a>! After I tracked that down, I wondered whether the Object of Rotary has been the same since the days of <a href="Paul Harris">Paul Harris</a> and the original Chicago Rotarians, and I found myself going down a fairly deep and twisty internet rabbit hole to



The Object of Rotary is to encourage and toster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an apportunity to serve society;
- 3 The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- 4. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Fortunately I stumbled upon an amazing series of articles by former Rotary International President (1992-1993)
Cliff Dochterman. A fellow Californian,
Cliff wrote a column for the weekly bulletin of the Rotary Club of North
Stockton in which he reported on interesting facts about Rotary
International and its history. Here is what he had to say about the Object of Rotary:

In some areas of the world weekly Rotary club meetings begin with all members standing and reciting the Object of Rotary. This statement, which comes from the Constitution of Rotary, is frequently seen on a wall plague in Rotarians' offices or place of business. The Object of Rotary is "to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise." The statement then lists four areas by which this "ideal of service" is fostered: through the development of acquaintance as the opportunity for service; the promotion of high ethical standards in business and professions; through service in one's personal, business and

community life; and the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace.

The Object of Rotary has not always been expressed in this manner. The original Constitution of 1906 had three objects: promotion of business interests, promotion of good fellowship and the advancement of the best interests of the community. By 1910 Rotary had five Objects as increased emphasis was given to expanding Rotary. By 1915 there were six Objects. In 1918 the Objects were rewritten again and reduced to four. Four years later they had again grown to six and were revised again in 1927.

Finally, at the 1935 Mexico City Convention the six Objects were restated and reduced to four. The last major change came in 1951, when the "Objects" were streamlined and changed to a single "Object" which is manifested in four separate ways. The "ideal of service" is the key phrase in the Object of Rotary. This ideal is an attitude of being a thoughtful and helpful person in all of one's endeavors. That's what the Object truly means.

If those aren't fun facts, I don't know what they are! Which brings me to a fun announcement:

Past President Dave Mans has accepted the new position of Club Historian! In that role he will

be responsible for maintaining the Club's archives so that as we enter our centennial year we will have all our historical ducks in a row! Thank you and congratulations, **Dave**!

**Armida Baylon** announced our next social event on February 22, 8PM -12PM, 1881 on Washington, a local jazz bar. Generally 1881 only serves drinks but there will be tacos available that evening.

President Mary Lou recognized the Program Committee, which has booked the programs

through the end of the year. **Past President Diana Peterson-More** and **Mic Hansen**, cochairs of the committee, and the other committee members all received Be the Inspiration Coins.

We also had a Rotary Education moment on <u>The Object of Rotary</u>. **Howard Raff, Debbie Loveland** and **Leah Snell** knew the answers.

**President Elect Scott Vandrick** introduced our speaker, David Lockington, the Music Director for the Pasadena Symphony and POPS. (Editorial note: if you weren't there, you missed a great speech. David combined an entertaining speech with exceptional cello performances).

David brought with him the traditional English Valentine's Day weather. He started with the most romantic piece he knew: Vocalise by Rachmaninoff, a composition originally written for voice and piano. He was accompanied by renowned pianist Alan Steinberger who plays regularly with the Pasadena Symphony and the Pasadena POPS.

Tchaikovsky gave Rachmaninoff high marks but when Rachmaninoff played for Tolstoy, Tolstoy shrugged and said people wanted to hear folk music. Rachmaninoff was one of a number of musicians who married his cousin.

J.S. Bach was another musician who married his cousin. Bach worked for a prince for six months and, during that time, he did not write religious music. David performed Prelude to 3rd Suite in C Major, a virtuoso piece for the cello. He recalled playing it the morning after his second daughter was born.

**Ken Stickney** and **Past President Philip Miles** each won 2 tickets to this weekend's performance of the Pasadena Symphony for knowing some of the answers. One of the questions was where was Tchaikovsky's first piano concerto premiered. The answer was Boston. The backstory was that when the great pianist Nikolai Rubinstein heard it, he called it vulgar. Tchaikovsky refused to premiere it in Russia and gave the premiere to Hans von Bulow, a conductor who was working in Boston at the time.

Tickets for the rest of the season can be had for 25% off. Performances include Mahler's Symphony #1 and Beethoven's Symphony #5. Symphonies are a reflection of life and, as each generation perceives life differently, the symphonies change.

Next season they will reflect the great music of the last 400 years and create a legacy of the composers of our time. They will feature six living, local composers, including 18 year old Sydney Wang, who has been commissioned to compose an overture and Michael Giacchino, who scored UP, and has now composed a piece celebrating the Apollo space program.

David ended the presentation with a performance of My Funny Valentine arranged by pianist Alan Steinberger, featuring a jazz riff in the middle.

President Mary Lou told us to Go Out There and Be the Inspiration.
