Speaker: Dr Julia Bradsher, President & CEO, Huntington Medical Research Institutes

Title: "Succeeding as a Small Independent Biomedical Research Institute: Lessons Learned from a Book You Might Read to Your Grandchild".

Dr. Julia E. Bradsher became the President and Chief Executive Officer of Huntington Medical Research Institutes in August 2018. Previous to joining HMRI, Dr. Bradsher served as President and CEO of the International Food Protection Training Institute (IFPTI) in Portage, Michigan from 2011 to July 2018. Prior to her tenure at IFPTI, she served as President and CEO of The Food Allergy & Anaphylaxis Network (FAAN), an organization focused on awareness and education regarding food allergies, informing public policy, and advancing research on the cause and potential treatments. Before joining FAAN, she held leadership and management roles in the pharmaceutical industry.

Dr. Bradsher has occupied adjunct faculty positions at the University of California, San Francisco; Sonoma State University; and San Francisco State University, and she was a Research Scientist at the New England Research Institute. Dr. Bradsher also completed a post-doctoral fellowship in the Pew Health Policy Program at the University of California,

San Francisco Institute for Health Policy Studies. She received her PhD in medical sociology from the University of Miami, and an MBA from the Sawyer School of Management at Suffolk University in Boston. Dr. Bradsher also holds an MS degree in gerontology from Baylor University and a BS degree in psychology from Millsaps College.

In her presentation, Dr. Bradsher will talk about the Huntington Medical Research Institutes, their strategy, focus, and how they are making a mark in the biomedical research world. She will utilize a well-loved children's book to apply some basic insights into HMRI's success and future endeavors.

Inspiration Station

Greetings, Pasadena Rotary! Let's do a little Rotary Education, shall we? Today's topic is "Pasadena Rotary's Board of Directors: What is it, and who's on it?" First, let's look at the relevant portion of our Club's Bylaws:

Article 2 Board of Directors

The governing body of this club shall be the Board, consisting of a minimum of twelve (12) members and a maximum of twenty (20) members of this club. There are two types of Board members:

Directors elected by the membership in accordance with Article 3, Section 1 of these Bylaws, plus the following five officers: President, President-Elect, Secretary, Treasurer, and the Immediate Past President. The foregoing five identified officers shall serve ex-officio as full voting members of the Board, without the necessity of having been elected as Directors by the club membership. These five voting officers shall be counted as part of the permitted number of Board members (12-20) in determining compliance with the stated minimum/maximum number of Board members, and as part of a quorum.

Article 3 Elections, Appointments, and Terms of Office

Section 1 Nomination and Election of Board Members

Within the First four months of each calendar year, during a regular meeting of the club, the President shall ask for nominations for members of the Board from the membership. Prior to this regular meeting, members of the Nominating Committee will have met, and will present at the meeting a slate of four Board candidates. The Nominating Committee is [composed] of the President, President-Elect, at least three recent Past Presidents, and three at-large members. The at-large members will be selected by the club membership at a regular Wednesday meeting. The nominations shall be placed on a ballot, presented to the membership for a vote, and the nominees receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared the elected Directors, to commence their terms at the beginning of the next [Rotary] Year [beginning on July 1]. To be considered for nomination as a Board member, the

Rotarian must be in good standing and have chaired at least one Rotary Committee.

. . .

Section 3 Appointment of Officers by President-Elect

Prior to the date that the President-Elect takes office as President, the President-Elect shall appoint to serve, during his or her term as President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and if desired, one or more Sergeant(s)-at-Arms.

As you may recall, the Club selected **Julie Bank**, **Michelle Ferroni**, and **Paul Martin** as the members-at-large for the Nominations Committee, which met last Wednesday evening.* Past President **Frank Nicholas** ably presided over the meeting of the committee, which also included yours truly and past presidents **Phil Miles** and **Kathy Meagher**. I am delighted to announce the following slate of distinguished nominees:

Robert Earnest

Michelle Ferroni

These four names will be on the ballot at the next regular meeting on March 6. Members may vote for the recommended slate or write in their own candidates who meet the qualifications stated above. When our newest Board members and officers are installed on July 1, we will say good-bye to **John Cooper**, **Gary Kearney**, **Robert Lyons**, and **Stephen Smith**, as well as Secretary **Dean Billman** and Immediate Past President **Phil Miles**. These gentlemen have had a great run and they will all be missed at our monthly Board meetings!

I am also pleased to report that **President-Elect Scott Vandrick** has selected his officers for the upcoming year. Scott has asked current Treasurer **Sean Cain** to stay on for another year, and Sean has agreed. And **Debbie Loveland** has agreed to serve as Secretary and has already taken District 5300's Club Secretary training. I think these are amazing choices and bode very well indeed for our upcoming Centennial year. Thanks to both of them for agreeing to serve!

Past President Diana Peterson-More announced that her book Consequential Communication in Turbulent Times: A Practical Guide to Leadership was the Number #1 New Release on Amazon on February 21. She gave \$37 to the Polio Pig, \$1 for every person

who bought it on that date and emailed her.

Scott Carlson announced that **Jan Moscaret** donated to the Polio Pig in honor of her 65th wedding anniversary with our dear late friend, Past President Gene Moscaret.

Past President Diana introduced our speaker, Val Zavela, the face of KCET. Val spent 30 years on-air before retiring. She is now on the combined Board of Directors for KCET and KOCE.

We watched a clip of <u>30 Years with Val Zavala</u>, part of which showed KCET reporting on greenhouse gases in 1988.

She traced the history of television, which was first available in the 40s. In 1950, only 9% of households had a TV. In 1965, we went from black & white to color. The remote control was a big deal and rooftop antennas were the bane of many households.

At one time, we had only 3 commercial networks - CBS, NBC and ABC - and PBS. There were only 3 sources of TV news, all headed by white men, with limited number of stories. However, the news was curated and fact-checked.

She recalls when KCET decided they needed a website. At the first meeting to discuss the idea, many people had no idea what a website was. Now we're awash in social media. However, TV is still the primary source of news for 57% of people.

In 2016, we saw the rise of fake news. Fake News isn't new. In 1835, the NY Sun had a front page story headlined Discovery of Life on the Moon. The next day, they ran a correction but the news had the desired effect - many new subscribers.

Now, new technology makes fake news more believable. We watched <u>Jordan Peele's warning on fake news</u>, in which it appears that Obama is saying something he never said. Fake news has proliferated because it's easy to produce, people fall for clickbait and people trust their "tribe." They are more likely to believe people who agree with them.

The good news is that there is no evidence that fake news swung the election; it did not influence swing voters, and Trump gave more misinformation than fake news stories.

Val recommended we watch the two-part <u>Frontline documentary on Facebook</u>.

After giving Val her speaker's gift, **President Mary Lou** told us to Go Out There and Be the Inspiration.
