Guest Speakers: George Lewis, Journalist Judy Muller, Journalist

Topic: Fake News

Introducer: Akila Gibbs



George Lewis was a correspondent for 42 years with NBC News. He retired from the network in 2012 and is now working on book projects and a blog.

The winner of three Emmys, the George Foster Peabody and Edward R. Murrow awards, he is no stranger to world crises.

Vietnam was his first assignment for NBC News starting in August 1970. Lewis remained there until May of 1972, returning to Vietnam in 1975 to cover the fall of Saigon.

In 1979, Lewis was in Teheran to cover the hostage crisis at the U.S. embassy. He remained in Iran for 66 days until the government expelled foreign journalists.

In 1989, Lewis was present in China for the revolt in Tiananmen Square and the revolution in Romania. During his career with NBC News, he has also covered

wars and revolutions in the Middle East, Latin America and Asia.

He was part of the NBC team that covered Operation Desert Storm. Lewis was also present in Lebanon for the 1982 Israeli invasion.

In the latter part of his NBC News career, Lewis reported on stories from his base in Los Angeles. His major domestic assignments have included covering earthquakes in California, the O.J. Simpson criminal and civil trials and the Los Angeles Olympics.

A recurring assignment for Lewis was the technology revolution, starting with the dawn of the Internet age in the 1990's. In a series of reports called "Almost 2001," Lewis and his NBC News colleagues were among the first broadcasters to allow viewers to interact via email.



Judy Muller, professor emerita of broadcast journalism at USC's Annenberg School of Communication and Journalism, has won numerous journalism awards in her career, including the Peabody, two Columbia-duPonts, two Edward R. Murrows, and numerous Emmy Awards.

Before coming to USC, Muller was a correspondent for ABC Network News, reporting for such broadcasts as Nightline, World News Tonight with Peter Jennings, Good Morning America, 20/20 and This Week.

During her 15 years at ABC, she covered such stories as the Rodney King beating trial and subsequent riots, the

Presidential campaigns of Paul Tsongas and Bob Kerrey, the L.A. earthquake in 1994, the O.J. Simpson case and numerous environmental stories throughout the West.

Prior to joining ABC News, Muller spent nine years as a correspondent for CBS News, where she was a contributor to CBS Sunday Morning and CBS Weekend News on the TV side and as a commentator and reporter on the radio side. She covered the space shuttle program, both national political conventions in 1988 and the 1988 George Bush presidential campaign. Muller was previously an anchor/reporter for KHOW in Denver and WHWH in Princeton. She has been a contributing commentator for NPR, and a contributing correspondent for Al Jazeera America and PBS' News Hour.

She is the author of two books: "Now This: Radio, Television and the Real World," and "Emus Loose in Egnar: Big Stories from Small Towns." She makes her home in Norwood, Colorado.

The timekeeper was **John Cooper**. Speeches had to be between 6 and 8 minutes long, relate to the theme Be the Inspiration, and incorporate the 4-way test.

The winner was the contestant from the Pasadena After Hours Rotary, a student from Maranatha HS. (Per Rotary rules we can't publish contestants' names.) Her speech topic was racism faced by Chinese students. She began her speech with questions that are asked of students from China. Among the questions she gets asked was "do you eat dogs?" At the end of the speech, she answered the questions. Less than 0.01% of Chinese people eat dogs in accordance with their traditions.

First runner-up was from San Marino High School (representing San Marino Rotary).

Runners up were both from La Salle, one representing Altadena Rotary and the other, our defending champion, representing our Pasadena Noon Club.

While the judges were deliberating, we had a musical interlude from a quartet from LaSalle High School.

President Mary Lou thanked the co-chairs Scott Vandrick and Mark Nicoletti. Mark got a Be the Inspiration, coin which he has long coveted. Each of the contestants got a Be the Inspiration lapel pin.
