

Out of the past, SPOKES SPEAKS! May the following quotations from a previous issue serve educationally to newer members and recreationally to all.

"The idea of a Rotary Club in Pasadena was first suggested to John Willis Baer, Vice President of the Union National Bank, in September, 1919, by Leo Chandler of the Los Angeles Rotary Club, at the request of Alex Sheriffs of San Jose, then District Governor.

"Dr. Baer could not serve owing to pressing business matters, so turned the entire matter over to CHARLIE HALL. Charlie had a front desk in the bank and was recipient of all requests, offerings, desires, demands, oddities, petitions and such that came in thru the swinging doors.

"This Rotary idea was one of the things that sounded good to Charlie. So in time, after many details were attended to, he called in thirteen of the worst offenders to meet with him. They listened, no doubt suspiciously, to a delineation of mysteries of "Service above Self" and "He Profits Most Who Serves Best".

"The minutes of this 'organization meeting' held on Mar. 18, 1920 disclose that the following were present. Geo. V. Baer, Hugh Chaffee, John M. Cole, W. T. Creller, C.J. Hall, J. HERERT HALL, S. Hazard Halsted, Reginald D. Johnson, Harold B. Landreth, Joe Leddy, WILL LEISHMAN, J. J. Mitchell, H. L. MILLER and Peter Orban.

C. J. HALL was temporary chairman and Geo. V. Baer, temporary secretary. Charter application cards were distributed to those present and also sent to names suggested by this organization group. All who signed those cards and were accepted were considered as Charter Members.

"On March 25, 1920, Acting President C. J. HALL presided over a meeting at which the Constitution and By-Laws were adopted. On the same day H. G. Chaffee was elected unanimously the Club's first President.

"On Apr. 1, 1920, a report was prepared and sent to the International Secretary stating that the Pasadena Club

was organized on March 25, 1920 with 16 Charter members, who would meet regularly on Mondays in the east wing of Hotel Green. The members whose names were attached to the printed report were: Geo. V. Baer, Hugh Chaffee, J. M. Cole, W. F. Creller, C. J. HALL, J. HERERT HALL, S. Hazard Halsted, J. E. HERBOLD, R. D. Johnson, Harold Landreth, Jos. E. Leddy, W. L. LEISHMAN, Chas. D. Lockwood, H. L. MILLER, J. J. Mitchell, Peter Orban.

"As visitors CHARLIE CRICK and Ed Stafford attended the lunch on May 20. JUDSON F. CLARK, Lemuel L. Test, A.L. Hawkins, CHAS. PRISK and Wm. Wilson were accepted to membership.

"On July 1, 1920, E. R. Braley, Geo. Greer and LEW TURNER were elected, although Lew had been appointed on a committee in June. The first semi-annual report to Rotary International showed 19 members.

"At an August meeting Stewart W. French, D. B. Rose and A. C. Tubbs were elected, and Dr. John Willis Eaer and Jas. W. Foley were made honorary members.

"In September, W. F. Ewing, IUCIUS JARVIS and J. M. Root were elected. In October, Geo. Brenner, ART HEI-MANN and John Mel came in. November welcomed J. TYLER PARKER, J. W. REEDER, J. H. Pearman, Samuel G. McMeen. A. J. Morris, Dr. Daniel F. Fox, C. W. Koiner and F. Milton Hunter joined the Club in December.

"The January 1921 report showed 36 members, including F. E. Stevens, elected that month. By this time the custom of quarterly billing for luncheons had been adopted. On Jan. 7, 1921, a rush telegram was addressed to the Rotary office in Chicago reading, "Please send by quickest carriage suggestions for Entertainment Committee...."

"February brought in BOB CASAMAJOR and Edward B. Robinson, and in April H. B. Landreth was elected second president of the Club."

So ended the first year of our Club. Rotary in 1920 had 560 clubs and 50,000 members. At present there are 5,018 Clubs and approximately 210,000 members. Pasadena has kept pace in ideals, in service and in membership, because the early pioneers of this Club, to whom we pay tribute today, built so soundly and so well.


