In our opinion, this will be pleasant news to everyone in America as well as our overseas Rotarians inasmuch as it will make Rio's convention in 1942 truly international.

Havana, with its easy accessibility, has been selected for the 1940 convention starting June 10, and Denver for the 1941 convention.




