Jerry Colangelo

Career-Community Award of Merit

PROGRAM INTRODUCTION: Adam Driggs

Jerry Colangelo arrived in the Valley of the Sun in 1968 to take over the expansion Phoenix Suns NBA franchise as the youngest general manager in professional sports. He has since guided the Suns into one of the most successful organizations in the NBA. He brought Major League Baseball to the Valley in 1998 and was chairman of the 2001 World Champion Arizona Diamondbacks. Colangelo was

the key element in facilitating the move of the NHL's Winnipeg Jets to the Valley of the Sun to become the Phoenix Coyotes. Colangelo was also on the founding committee for the WNBA, and



the Phoenix Mercury were one of the league's inaugural teams in 1997.

Colangelo's impact on the sports scene in Phoenix and the game of basketball has been so great, he was elected to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in April 2004. He has been among The Sporting News most powerful people in sports for over the last decade and he was

appointed as the first managing director of the USA Basketball Men's Senior National Team

program for the 2005-2008 quadrennium in April 2005. Colangelo assembled the coaches and players of the "Redeem Team," who returned USA Basketball to Olympic glory and claimed the gold medal at the 2008 Games in Beijing.

The former chairman of the NBA's Board of Governors, Colangelo has had a major influence on the growth of the NBA. With the Suns, his roles have included general manager, head coach, president, managing general partner, chief executive officer and now chairman. The 40-plus-year tenure with one franchise is the longest in the NBA. Colangelo spent two seasons with the Chicago Bulls working as marketing director, scout and assistant to the president before moving to the Valley to help start the expansion Suns.

Colangelo's commitment to the Valley transcends sports and he is well-known as one of the city's most active community leaders. In recognition of his efforts in the community, Phoenix mayor Phil Gordon proclaimed March 26, 2004, Jerry Colangelo Day in the city of Phoenix. The Valley

of the Sun United Way also bestowed its highest honor, the Spirit of Caring award, to Colangelo on June 30, 2005 for his passion for improving lives in the community.

Colangelo enrolled at the University of Kansas, but transferred after his prospective teammate, Wilt Chamberlain, left the Jayhawks for a pro contract. Colangelo transferred to the University of Illinois, where he earned All-Big Ten honors, captained the Illini as a senior and was later inducted into the Illinois Basketball Hall of Fame. He also played two years of baseball at Illinois.

Born November 20, 1939, Colangelo grew up in the "Hungry Hill" neighborhood of Chicago Heights. Colangelo and his wife, Joan, whom he met on a blind date while at the University of Illinois, have four children: Kathy Holcombe, Kristen Brubaker, Bryan and Mandie Colangelo, and six granddaughters and four grandsons.

Phoenix Rotary 100 President **Joe Prewitt** opened the 15th meeting of the 103rd year (5,141st overall) with a call to order. Joe gave a quick synopsis of today's meeting activities and speaker topic. He also




said it is a privilege to be president of this Club.

Jim Soudriette gave the invocation and led the membership in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. Lisa Compton led the club in singing "America the Beautiful" with PP Chuck Emerson accompaniment on the piano. PP Jos Anshell introduced our guests and visitors.

Randy Long gave the secretary's report and announced events; which included Rotary Happy Hour on October 13 at Luci's at the Orchardsponsored by Ralph Tapscott (which had a good turnout and a beautiful location); the satellite club meetings; the Kitchen on the Screet packing event on October 29; and the gala on November 5 at Phoenix County Club. He then turned over the meeting for table ambassador time. Photographer for the day was Pearlette Ramos and our reporter was Steve Johnson.

President-elect and gala committee chair **Allister Adel** asked for gala donations and silent auction items, and reminded members register



Tony Cerato presented Paul Harris Fellows to Dick Karpinski (his ninth) and Georgia Wolfe (her second). Georgia said she is appreciative of the recognition and the good work the Rotary Foundation does, but said she is most supportive of the money and effort spent in the United States. She contributes mainly due to PDG Craig Wilson. The club goal is to have the membership achieve 100 percent member giving, and we are 65 percent to that goal.

PP **Jos Anshell** took the podium to conduct some rooster fining with three selected subjects to pick on: **Steve Thomas**, **Jim Soudriette** and **Bill Gumbert**. Each was asked if they knew the word that would describe a particular situation, or combinations of situations and events. All were made-up words and descriptions that no one guessed correctly.

a regular member due to his past experience as a seven-year member of the Rotary Club of Bend, Oregon. JD became a Paul Harris Fellow in 2009 and looks forward to being involved in Phoenix Rotary 100 activities.

Jason Ebe made special recognition of birthdays, and our one recipient was President **Joe Prewitt**. Joe seemed resistant to having his birthday receive any special recognition, and acquiesced to the fine and also to having the club membership sing him "Happy Birthday."

President Joe gave a brief president's report before turning over the mic to **Randy Pullen** to introduce our speaker of the day, Arizona Secretary of State **Michele Reagan**, who talked to us about the responsibilities of



her office, duties of her staff and elections.

Michele opened by saying that the upcoming election is the fourth one this year – the most the State of Arizona has ever had in one year. With



each election, her staff (160 strong) and many of the staff of the State Library System travel to all 700 polling locations to make sure the equipment and processes are set up to run as they should. Her

office works with 15 county recorders, and they each do things a little differently. Her office also takes care of all business filings for the state, and they have processed 7,000 filings this year.

Michele spoke about a website hacking incident that occurred in June. The FBI called her office to say they had found a username and password for sale on the dark web, and it belonged to one of the administration staff. The voter registration system was taken down for 10 days while the FBI investigated, and went back up in July. The FBI was confident that no harm had been done. The story broke nationally on August 29, and she saw that Arizona was not the only state with an issue. Since that time, security measures have been improved, and Arizona's practices have become a model for other states to follow. Michele said the website offer the ability to obtain voting information. She urged all to go to voter.azsos.gov to see all pertinent information regarding elections, candidates and funding. The interactive site is available in English and Spanish.

After a brief Q&A period, President Joe thanked Secretary of State Michele Reagan for her words and adjourned the meeting.




