Bill Serr offered a Day-100 towards his Lasley Fellowship for the historic Centerville Elks Basketball State Championship win as well as the Division IV win for Botkins Highschool. Jacquie Powell pledged a Day-100 for hosting the Ohio Athletic Championships and for the grateful return of the NCAA to Dayton in 2022 to 2026! Gerry Chadwick shared a Day-100 (Lasley) for his birthday from last week. Also, in recognition of the Williamson so OU upset win which was big news to celebrate along with some family birthdays it was a great weekend all around! David Williamson answered the Chadwick donation with a Day-32 in recognition of his beloved OU Bobcats making it to the field of 32. Wearing a festive OU shirt and sitting in front of an OU campus vista as his Zoom background, David also gave a shout out to Shaun Yu for his successful WDPR campaign. President Brian invited Judd Plattenburg to do a New Member Introduction: Judd introduced Carly Lindstrom, from Buckingham Advisors as our newest member. Carly is an active community volunteer serving on several Boards including URS and Clothes That Work. She loves the outdoors and enjoys hiking and kayaking. Brian then called on Diane Welborn for a Foundation Check Presentation to CityHeart. Diane welcomed Kris Sexton, who accepted the grant on behalf of this organization that is providing service to the needy in the downtown Dayton area. Their mission has been especially critical during Covid and they are working towards a goal of \$20,000 to expand their Covid response in the community in 2021. Located in Christ Episcopal Church, this \$3,000 will allow City Heart the opportunity to continue their good work and carryout their mission into the future.

Brian congratulated Kris on receiving this grant. Before turning the floor over to the Chair of the Day, Brian offered his condolences to Jeff Hoagland for the loss of his mother on Thursday. He extended his deepest sympathies to Jeff and his family on behalf of the club and turned the meeting over to Chair of the Day, Jim Gallagher.

Jim Gallagher began his introduction of General Les Lyles, USAF (Ret.) by remembering him for the many roles he held before retiring in 2003 as the Commander of Air Force Material Command at WPAFB. They enjoy a history of more than 50 years of a working relationship. Jim was proud to share many honors and accomplishment of Gen. Lyles that include appointments and service to many Boards including USAA Board of Directors for 15 years, 7 as Board Chair, positions with General Dynamics, DP&L, and Jobs Ohio, to name a few. Gen. Lyles was appointed by Congress to serve on the Military Diversity Council; by President Trump to the National Space Council; other appointments include the NASA Advisory Council and the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum Board. He has held many distinguished titles and earned countless awards and medals, but as a pilot he earned the call name of Dude and Jim rounded out his introduction by presenting General ◆Dude◆ as the speaker on ◆A Summary of How Government Agencies and Corporations are Addressing Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. Gen. Lyles began his remarks by referencing the broadcast of 60 minutes on CBS last night which featured a segment focused on racism within the military. Similar information to what he is speaking about today can be found in that segment. Eleven years ago, Congress asked Gen. Lyles to serve on and Chair the Military Leadership Diversity Commission to examine why there have not been more women and minorities in Leadership roles in the military. There were 16 questions assigned to the commission to consider including how do you define diversity? with key recommendations being made to the Secretary of Defense. Some of the commission s findings included:


- It starts at the top
- Recruiting diversely
- · Developing people to be the best they can be
- Mentoring is necessary
- Accountability

A key outcome was the ofirst Diversity Summit of the Air Force, although in his role as the Vice Chief of Staff of the USAF, Gen. Lyles held a diversity summit in 2010. Ten years later they held another summit to revisit the subject in 2020. Following the racially charged events of 2020, the sense of urgency to address the challenges of diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) has increased dramatically. Jobs Ohio has been doing a great job addressing this issue at the state level; USAA is addressing it well too as an example of corporate engagement. The NACD (National Association of Corporate Directors) assembled a blue-ribbon panel for which Gen. Lyles served as Chair, to look at corporate boards to help address D&I at the corporate level. �Diversity and Inclusion is just illusion without action from those Board members. It is not about counting the heads around the table, unless those heads count, was a statement from an NACD panel member who succinctly defined the issue that later became a guide for the mission of the panel swork. D&I is an issue in all levels of the corporate world � from General Dynamics to General Motors. The keynote speaker at the USAA Diversity Summit was Mellody Hobson, the wife of Hollywood Director, George Lucas, and Chairwoman of the DreamWorks Board of Directors. In her role as Chairwoman, she was even a victim of the white male boardroom tradition where her suggestions were ignored until a white male counterpart made the same suggestions. This experience is one similar to what is happening at all levels of business and in our communities. We must do better.

The three C�s are an effective way to tackle the problem: Communicate, communicate, communicate � and Commitment, consistency, and culture
