President Elect Walt then asked Mike Pabst to stand and have his red ribbon removed. Karla Garrett Harshaw introduced our newest Rotarian, Kevin Mulder from Legal Aid of Western Ohio.

Patty Caruso, Chair of the Day introduced our speaker for the day, Tim Benford, President of the Electric Auto Association's Drive Electric Dayton Chapter. Tim gave us a brief introduction of himself he spent 20 years in Royal AF Logistics and 3 years as a foreign liason office in the 70's at Wright Patterson AFb. After retirement in 1985 from the AF they immigrated back to Dayton and spent 24 years consulting in the US. In 2006 Tim was troubled by AI Gore's book on climate change that he started to take a serious interest in the topic. In 2015 he made a visit to the Tessla store in Cincinnati when the model 3 was developed he and his wife placed their order on March 31, 2016 for their car and waited 2 years 21 days and 51 minutes. TIm next developed a Facebook page for Electric Vehicle Enthusiatss and have been prganzing ride and drive events since.

Recent June headlines on EVs...

- Canada is going to ban new gas-powered cas sales by 2035
- GM boosts EV and AV investments to \$35 billion by 2025
- · Audi says it will produce its last internal combustion engine by 2033, only launch new EVs by 2026
- · Goodbye conbustion cars! Volkswagen will bet on it electric cars in the near future
- Ram trucks go electric starting in 2024

Deciding why to drive electric...the experience is quiet, smooth and zippy. The safety rate is high with great front crash testing ratings space up front is all crumple zone and very stable with low rollover risk in with SUV. Other good features include zero tailpipe emissions electric grid is getting cleaner so no longer just coal driven now turning more to solar and wind power. No more oil changes, no more gas stations and far less maintenance and fuel costs. Many models of EVs available and there are tax incentives to buy one. You are driving the future with LCD screens include latest tech and software upgrades. Consumer Reports data indicate you will save an average of \$4,600 (50%) in vehicle lifetime repair/maintence costs vs a gasoline-powered car. The brakes don't wear out and the power train of an EV has 1/100th of the moving parts vs gas powered vehicles. Fuel with charging at home you will save \$1,000/year in fuel costs (\$1500 savings in gas and \$500 increase in electric costs) with an average of 13,500 miles driven in a year. Where can I charge an electric vehicle... the cheapest and most convenient is to charge at home you get faster charging with a 240Volt circuit. Many companies these days are making workplace charging an option. When you are away-from-home you can find charging stations with the car's built in app or google or apple maps. The number of public chargers in growing fast, expected to triple in Dayton in the next two years. What will be different about driving electric...enjoy driving, preconditioned air (heat or AC), planned routes on longer trips to plan for super chargers, less maintenance.

EVs are a little more expensive up front however the savings over 5 years makes up for some of that from tax credits and fuel and maintenance savings.

Tim then showed us several slide of Electric Sedans and Hybrid and Electric SUVs and Cross Over vehicles available in Ohio. Electric pick ups are coming next year. We ended the day with Q&A and with going out to the circle outside the great hall and taking a look at several Electic Vehicles.

Kevin C. Mulder has been the Executive Director, Legal Aid of Western Ohio, Inc. (LAWO) since December 1999. LAWO provides free legal assistance to low-income individuals and groups in civil (non-criminal) cases and matters, including domestic violence and other areas of family law, housing and community economic development, access to government benefits, education, and debt collection and bankruptcy. It has special programs to serve domestic violence survivors, seniors, and agricultural farmworkers. LAWO is responsible for meeting the legal needs of clients in 32 counties in northwest and west central Ohio, including Toledo and the Miami Valley area, and agricultural workers throughout the state. LAWO has seven offices, which include an office in downtown Dayton and a main office at the Center for Equal Justice in Toledo. LAWO works closely with its partner law firm, Advocates for Basic Legal



Equality, Inc. (ABLE), in meeting client needs. The justice system can be a powerful tool for rectifying injustice. LAWO and ABLE seek to ensure that all persons and communities, regardless of financial position, have access to the justice system and to

make a significant improvement in their lives. Kevin started his legal career in Toledo in 1991 as an attorney with ABLE representing clients in employment law cases. Before joining ABLE, Kevin served as an assistant public defender in New York and as a law clerk for the federal district court in Kalamazoo, Michigan. He is a graduate of the Columbia University School of Law (LL.M. 1991); American University, School of International Service (M.A. 1985); American University, Washington College of Law (J.D. 1984); and Central Michigan University (B.S. 1980). Kevin and his wife Beatrice reside in Toledo and have two daughters.

Breakdown on Cost:
