

All District Grant Submissions Funded

Our clubs submitted 32 District Grant requests this year for projects in the new Rotary year. The total request was for \$75,000. The Rotary Foundation through its District Grant funding will fund 68% of that amount. Your District Leadership voluntarily stepped up and agreed to fund the remaining 32% from District Financial reserves.

As clubs are just beginning to meet in person again through local community projects they are staying relevant in their communities. To support all the clubs the use of District Reserves for funding District Grants is especially appropriate for the new Rotary year.

Rotarians in our District are just coming out of an unanticipated global pandemic that required behavior modification like no other Rotary year. The full funding of these District Grants will provide over \$200,000 in projects for our communities.

District 6670 s first satellite club, The Rotary Satellite Club of Fairborn Yellow Springs was chartered June 7, 2021. This new club inspired by Fairborn Rotarians Dan Robrish and Rob Degenhart and supported by Fairborn Rotary s membership chair Marilyn McCauley, the club leadership, and members, saw the opportunity to create this new type of club in the Village of Yellow Springs. The club has 13 members and meets the second and fourth Tuesdays at 6 p.m. in Yellow Springs.

RI created satellite clubs in 2013 for people who wanted to join Rotary or who wanted to form a new club but did not have the minimum 20 members required to form a regular club. The satellite s sponsoring club provides advice and support and satellite members are officially members of the sponsoring club. Satellite clubs hold regular meetings, have bylaws, and are involved in community service projects. Once membership reaches 20 members, the club can choose to apply to be a standalone Rotary club or remain a satellite.

The Club wasted no time becoming *People of Action* by answering the call from the Yellow Springs Village Mayor to help install the village s flags in honor of Flag Day on June 14th.

North East Cincinnati Rotary Service Above Self



The Rotary Club of Northeast Cincinnati is serving community needs in our service area and in Mexico. Through our Helping Hands program, we are working with 3 local non-profit organizations to meet emergency needs of individuals and families. For example, through Sycamore Bridges \$200 was given to a mother for car repairs so she can have transportation to work. We gave \$500 to Princeton Closet for use of a laundromat, detergent, dryer sheets, and Kroger/Target gift cards to a family affected by an apartment fire. To address mental health initiatives for students and provide for an emergency relief fund, we provided Operation Give Back with \$1,350. In Puerto Vallarta,

Mexico we are working with the local Rotary Club there to give scholarships to students to complete their education and get a head start in working for a living.

Known as the Volcanes Community Education Project, we are sponsoring 10 elementary school students, 10 middle and high school students and 14 University students. Our financial support for University students makes it possible for them to finish their studies, obtain a diploma, and receive a certificate from the Mexican government to work in their field of study.

NEC Rotary has contributed more than \$10,000 to the VCEP program. We are making a long term commitment to change people s lives, past NEC Rotary President Doug Taylor said.

Transitions Underway in the Dayton Rotary Club

The Dayton Club is quite busy with many transitions for June and into July.

President Brian Martin is winding down his tenure. He has been our one and only 100% virtual president thus far. But wait - Brian will be hosting our mixed mode meetings (virtual and in person) starting on June 14! So, for the last 3 meetings in his term, Brian will stand at the podium, with tie

and jacket, and will swing the gavel! We hope to work through the mixed mode meeting process over these three weeks so that President Elect Shaun Yu has a reasonably seamless term of mixed mode meetings. Now that wev to used Zoom for a year, we plan to continue it to reach all of our Rotarians as well as speakers who may not live in the area.

Due to Sinclair College purchasing our current office location, the Dayton Club is also moving offices from South Perry Street to South Dixie Drive. Through the generous support of Rotarian Rick Schwartz, the club will be moving into the headquarters of WinSupply. We are looking forward to beginning a new chapter through this new office and board room that will host our club and foundation board meetings. We plan to move on September 2, 2021. The club s new address will be: 3111 South Dixie Ave. Suite 414, Dayton, Ohio 45439.

Due to the pandemic, we are also beginning a new financial model as a club. Previously, the club required prepaid lunch payments for everyone attending or not. Since there was no lunch option as we were completely meeting virtually, we had to change our model. Through the pandemic, we have been charging all members a flat \$120 per quarter in dues. This flat dues structure will continue and will increase over time. We are partnering with Sinclair College for lunch still but members must reserve their space and pay for their lunch separately from dues. The Board feels this is a much more sustainable model in the long term. Those who will not desire lunch may always use the teleconferencing meeting option.

With Brian support and encouragement the Club International Services Committee was able to achieve the approval of a Global Grant with a budget of \$80,000 for Clean Water, Sanitation and Hygiene in the San Juan de Inguincho Community in Ecuador. Also, during Brian s year as President, the club completed three District Grants and submitted two for the new Rotary year. Even with a global pandemic, mask requirements, social distancing and observing all health guidelines from all agencies, the Club was able to carry out local community and international goals.
