Rotarian Peace Projects Incubator

In Rotary, 23 February is our anniversary, and February is also the month when we focus on promoting peace. There is a reason for this: Contributing to peace and international understanding has been a high priority for us since our earliest days.

We are often asked: "How can we get involved in peace now?" There are many paths to peace in Rotary. Our youth programs point us in the direction of Positive Peace, as does the work of intercountry committees and the Rotary Action Group for Peace.

Another path is the Rotarian Peace Projects Incubator (RPPI), an inspirational collaboration among Rotarians, Rotaractors, and Rotary Peace Fellows and alumni. Led by Rotarians in Switzerland and Liechtenstein, RPPI has designed 48 global projects that any club can support, either directly or through Rotary Foundation global grants. Nino Lotishvili and Matthew Johnsen, alumni of the Rotary Peace Center at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, are two of the many volunteers.

Trekking through the snow to deliver vaccines

On a wintery November day, vaccinators across Afghanistan wrapped up warm,



checked that they had facemasks and hand sanitizer, and headed out into the cold morning. Their mission? To reach 9.9 million children with polio vaccines, before snowfall blocked their way.

From valleys to muddy lanes, we look at some of the environments where vaccinators work, as well as some of the key challenges that have made 2020 one of the toughest years for polio eradicators.

For some vaccinators, the first snows had already arrived. At the top of the Panjshir valley, Ziaullah and Nawid Ahmad started their day at 7am.

"We walked six hours to Sar-e Tangi and back to take polio drops to the last houses in the valley", said Ziaullah. The mountainous roads in this area are impassable by car, so vaccinators walk many kilometers to the most remote villages. Sar-e Tangi means 'top narrow edge', and the view during the long winter is of snowy peaks.

A few kilometers from Sar-e Tangi, father Arsalan Khan was proud to have protected his own and other children in the extended family with polio drops. He said, "I ensure all the children in the family are vaccinated during each round the drops were offered and of course I will keep vaccinating them each time the vaccinators visit our village".

Khan continued, "The vaccinators walk long distances across the mountain slopes to our villages, sometimes during harsh weather conditions, to bring polio drops to our doors."

"Thanks to the people and countries that support the vaccination campaigns and make it possible for the drops to reach our doorsteps."



Through the input of local neighbors and community members, a list of needs and goals were established for the Good Neighbor Day event. The 33 volunteers with the collaboration of 9 organizations completed the following good neighbor deeds:

- mowed lawns and collected trimming
- planted 14 trees
- trimmed trees and vines
- repaired and cleaned gardens
- repaired 2 park benches
- stained picnic tables
- cleaned graffiti
- connected with neighbors
- picked up litter
- collected recycling
- cleaned gutters
- repaired fences
- placed numbers on homes
- gained laughter and fellowship within the community.

All activities were done outdoorrs with proper social distancing protocols. Volunteers worked with their families, used hand sanitizer, and wore face masks to protect themselves and the community.



Promoting Rotary Through Positive Influence

Many of you may be familiar with marketing researcher Dr. Robert Cialdini. Dr. Cialdini is recognized as an expert in the science of influence. He first published *Influence: The Psychology of Persuasion* in 1984, and it has since become required reading for entrepreneurs and business leaders.

Cialdini defined 6 key principles which influence how we make decisions:

- 1. Reciprocity
- 2. Commitment/Consistency
- 3. Social Proof
- 4. Authority
- 5. Liking
- 6. Scarcity

Cialdini calls these principles shortcuts: they lead us to draw conclusions faster. While they can be used in a negative way to manipulate consumers into product purchases, they are nevertheless innate and can underlie how people respond to us .. and to our Rotary clubs. Over the next few months, we'll look at these principles and how they can be used to project a positive image of Rotary.

Principle

(This is how the principle works, according to Cialdini)

The Reciprocity Principle: In many social situations, we pay back what we received from others.

- Offer something first allow them to feel indebted to you.
- Offer something exclusive allow them to feel special.

Apply to Rotary

(This is how Rotary can responsibly use the principle)

Give a small gift to a prospective member on behalf of your club. (A Rotary-branded pen, flashlight, tape measure, flash-drive, etc.)

Be somewhat selective who you give them to (otherwise, it's just free stuff for the junk drawer.) If you think someone is a great potential

- Personalize the offer make sure they know it's from you.

member, tell them! When you do, hand them a small and useful token to remind them. ...not just to remind them that Rotary is a club in their community, but remind them that **YOU** made a special effort to tell them they were important.
