Each year, Rotary awards up to 130 fully funded fellowships for dedicated leaders from around the world to study at one of our peace centers.

Through academic training, practice, and global networking opportunities, the Rotary Peace Centers program develops the capacity of peace and development professionals to become effective catalysts for peace. The fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and internship and field-study expenses.



Since the program began in 2002, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1,700 fellows who now work in over 140 countries. Many serve as leaders in governments; NGOs; education and research institutions; peacekeeping and law enforcement agencies; and international organizations like the United Nations and the World Bank.

We see peace not as an abstract concept but as a living, dynamic expression of human development. Peacebuilding is a cornerstone of our mission as a humanitarian service organization and is one of Rotary's areas of focus — the channels of activity through which our members make their mark on the world. Our programs, grants and fellowships focus on creating environments where peace can be built and maintained. Rotary believes that if concerned citizens work together to create peace locally, lasting change can happen globally.

Paying Our Rotary Foundation Forward

From time to time, it is good for us to reflect and take stock of how we benefit today from the past donations and planned gifts to Our Rotary Foundation made by Rotarians of the past. It's a "pay-it-forward" concept that helps you and your club afford service projects in your community (through District Grants) and worldwide (through various forms of Global Grants). These past Rotarians thought of the future so that Rotary and OUR Foundation would continue to thrive.

Charitable giving to support OUR Rotary Foundation is a journey. It might begin with a modest monthly donation of \$10 through Rotary Direct. This allows you to control your amount and timing of your donations. We do not demand this of our members, but we do expect this first modest step to be taken. After all, this step is less than the cost of a once-a-week designed coffee drink would be.

We encourage clubs and Rotarians to secure and use funds for a District Grant in their community or a Global Grant for an international project of importance to them. This is a given because it is the heart and purpose of Rotary. At the same time, all appreciate that the cost of community or global service projects rises each year. In that context, we need for our donations to keep pace and then some with these costs.

This RY 2023/2024 our District 7610 District Block Grants provided participating clubs with \$2300 for their projects. This coming **RY 2024/2025 that amount will be \$3500**. Terrific!

However, over the past 5-years, what has been our personal and club TRF giving, and is it assuring a solvent Rotary Foundation for the future? To assure that, our giving must out-pace our spending. As you check your own donations, ask your club Rotary Foundation chair to share the annual totals for your club's giving over the last 5-years.

Is your club's total exceeding what you receive annually in District and/or Global Grant support or are you falling short?

A review of our District collective giving:

RY 2018/2019 – YOU raised \$1.1 million.

RY 2019/2020 & RY 2020-2021 – COVID years, YOU raised over \$530,000 each respectfully.

RY 2021/2022 was an in-&-out COVID year, but YOU raised \$1.2 million.

RY 2022/2023 YOU raised \$927,000...just missing the 1 million dollar level.

Against this backdrop of OUR previous 5-years of collective giving to OUR Rotary Foundation, asking you to beat this year the \$927,000 total of last year is not a reach. Nor is our goal for RY 2024/2025 of reaching over \$1 million for our Rotary Foundation.

If every Rotarian donated \$120/annually, and then 30% of us donated more than \$1000/year as Paul Harris Society, Major Donor, Bequest Society, Endowment donors and more...this district would be a one-million dollar TRF donation district every year.

We would be "beating" in donations at a net-positive the amount that we have been taking back in grant spending. That leaves OUR Rotary Foundation of the future in good shape for the Rotarians and grant projects that will follow all of us.

The Rotary Foundation Team looks forward to working with you and your club in achieving these goals so that "As they have given to us, let us give to those who come after us."

Remembering Why March Annual Fund Report

In this month's letter, I wanted to take a moment to assess why I give to The Rotary Foundation. I am not poor, but not affluent. In fact, I am a single mom faced with the need to feed and clothe two growing boys who look and eat more like men. I am also often asked why I am so dedicated to Rotary and often say yes when I may be better served to say no. I even admit to feeling a bit overwhelmed and asking myself that same question.

At C-PETS this past weekend I remembered **my why** as I was honored to meet and hear from The Rotary Foundation chairman and Past Rotary International President, Barry Rassin, who reminded me that we are still working to eradicate Polio and reiterated the value of donations to The Rotary Foundation, and how each donation is a force multiplier. In this address he talks about how it takes many people only giving a little to fund a lot and shocked me with the fact that almost 60% of 1 million Rotarians globally do not actually make any donations. My challenge to each club TRF chair and each Rotarian is to try to reconnect with your why and then spread that message. Below is a chart indicating where we are as a District – we are trending lower than any of our previous years and need to work to turn this around quickly.

Your Report from the PolioPlus Corner

2023 Polio Case Totals. The chart below shows “near-final” 2023 case totals for wild polio and vaccine-derived polio. As of February 21, the number of wild polio cases in 2023 is holding at 12. But, as the footnote to the chart says, analytical laboratories are still working on samples obtained in 2023. And if one or more of those cases turn up positive for polio, they will count on 2023 totals.

World Immunization Week. The World Health Organization recognizes April 24-30 each year as World Immunization Week. Rotary takes advantage of this to highlight the critical importance of polio vaccinations in protecting children from the debilitating effects of polio. World Immunization Week is also a key moment in the year to show the success of vaccines in reducing polio cases by more than 99.9% since the Global Polio Eradication Initiative was established in 1988, which provides proof that vaccines work. Go to www.endpolio.org/resource-center for new information and materials your club can use to host a polio-related event during World Immunization Week.



Why Do We Still Give to Polio? Five major reasons (any one is sufficient):

To improve lives: 20 million walk today who wouldn't otherwise.

To invest in the future: 200,000 kids each year would be paralyzed if we stop.

To improve child health: vaccination efforts also monitor other health problems.

To save money: no polio would save \$40-\$50 billion in health costs within 20 years.

To make history: one of history's greatest public health achievements.

Reminder: Health authorities universally use the calendar year, not the Rotary year, in reporting all of their efforts.

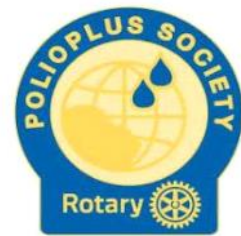
