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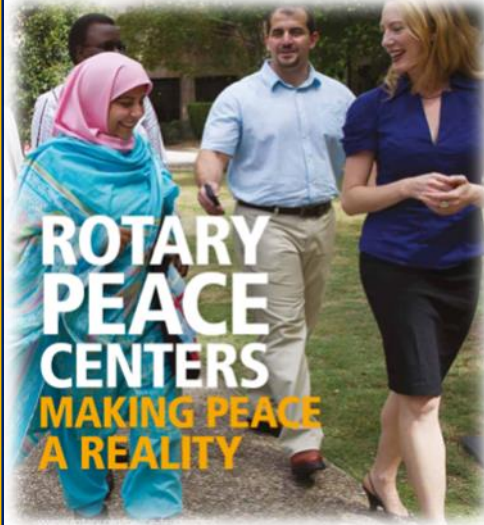

The Rotary Peace Centers draw from Rotary's long, unwavering commitment to peace, seen in projects that address the root causes of conflict. 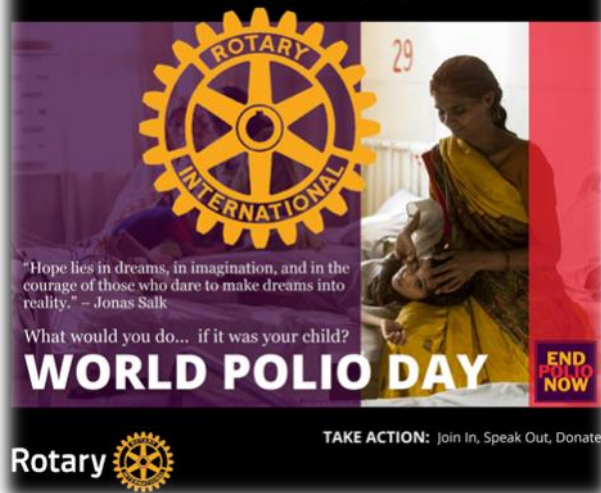
Rotary Peace Fellows are committed to the advancement of peace, serving as leaders in a range of international, national, and local organizations. They promote national and international cooperation, peace, and the successful resolution of conflict in their lives, in their careers, and through their service activities.

More information is coming very soon, but here are some tidbits to entice you: **the challenge will include choosing to do a mental or physical activity each day for 30 minutes for 30 days, and asking friends/family/sponsors to donate \$\$ to the Polio Plus Fund to support your commitment.** Also, several members of the District Team (ME INCLUDED) will celebrate the inevitable success of this fundraiser by plunging into some very cold water this winter.

We could all use some self-care, so participating in this campaign can improve the lives of children around the world by preventing the spread of polio, and help us all develop habits that improve mental health! I hope you consider participating, and encourage your fellow club members to do the same.

Major Donors Ask, Where Does Our Money Go?

Major Donor is a recognition for Rotarians who have given generously to support humanitarian projects, scholarships, and vocational training teams. Most people don't think about recognition when they donate, but do members realize how their money is used?

A brief view of how donations are spent follows:

- **Global grants** support large international projects with long-term, sustainable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. They range from \$30,000 to \$400,000.
- **District grants** fund smaller-scale, short-term projects that address immediate needs in our community or abroad.
- **Disaster response grants** support disaster relief and recovery efforts through grants from the Rotary Disaster Response Fund.
- **Programs of scale grants** support Rotary member-led, evidence-based, programs that have already demonstrated success.

Specific examples of the clubs of District 7610 actively supporting 34 many types of Global and District Grants, include:

- √ Water and Sanitation Upgrades for Mount Moria, Mansana and Buteko Schools in Luanshya, Zambia where the existing water and sanitation facilities are in disrepair
- √ Repairing Hurricane damage to La Guadalupe School in Honduras.
- √ Supporting Carpenter's Shelter sanitation and food distribution as well as educational programs and shelter to families in need
- √ Providing a deep bore well at the National School in Chantal Haiti. Repair the school's bathrooms and improving sanitation
- √ Blessing Boxes provide the recipients (Veterans) basic hygiene products and toiletries, non-perishable goods (canned food and snacks) and perishable food living
- √ Provide Dolly Parton's Imagination Library Program to eligible children in the 22901, 22902 and 22903 zip codes
- √ Creating personal care packages for teen girls and women living in transitional housing situations in Stafford County
- √ Donations to The Rotary Foundation's Disaster Response Fund from 3 March to 30 April 2022 provided humanitarian aid to regions that supported Ukrainian refugees and others who were affected.

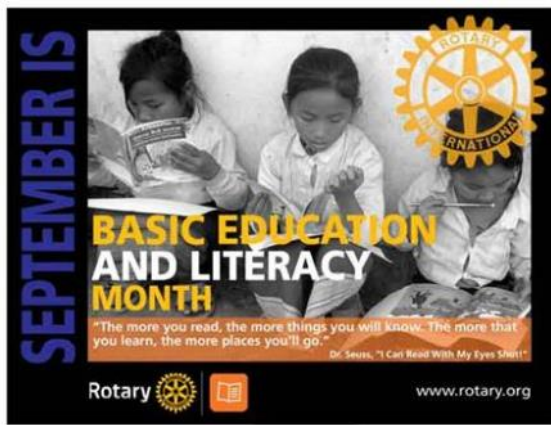

September is "Basic Education and Literacy" month in Rotary. Basic education and literacy is one of The Rotary Foundation's seven Areas of Focus. We know that basic education and literacy are essential for reducing poverty, improving health, encouraging community and economic development, and promoting peace.

Consider these facts:

- If all women completed primary education, there would be 66% fewer maternal deaths.

- A child born to a mother who can read is 50% more likely to survive past the age of five.
- If all students in low-income countries left school with basic reading skills, 171 million people could be lifted out of poverty, which would be equivalent to a 12% cut in world poverty.

The world is making good progress in this area. According to a United Nations Millennium Development Goals progress report, literacy rates among adults and youths are on the rise and the gender gap in literacy is narrowing. But pressing global needs remain:

- 58 million children worldwide are out of school.
- Even after four years of primary schooling, as many as 250 million children cannot read and write.
- 781 million adults are illiterate.

Rotary supports activities and training to improve education for all children and literacy for children and adults.

TRF Area of Focus Statement of Purpose and Goals:



TRF enables Rotarians to ensure that all people have sustainable access to basic education and literacy by: Supporting programs that strengthen a community's ability to provide basic education and literacy to all, increasing adult literacy, working to reduce gender disparity in education and, funding graduate scholarships for career-minded professionals related to basic education and literacy

What can your club do to support the Basic Education & Literacy Area of Focus?

The following parameters for grant eligibility should give you some ideas.

- Improving academic outcomes at the early childhood, primary, and secondary levels, in collaboration with local school officials,
- Educating adults in reading, writing, and numeracy skills,
- Providing professional development opportunities for teachers with a qualified trainer in curriculum implementation, effective instructional methods, or student assessments,
- Strengthening basic educational outcomes by providing improved learning materials and facilities supported by enhanced curricula and new professional development for teachers,
- Improving academic support for before- and after-school programs by training tutors and teachers, conducting student assessments, and providing equipment if needed,
- Supporting educators' ability to help students with physical or developmental disabilities achieve greater academic outcomes by providing professional development opportunities for teachers and staff, as well as basic educational materials and enhanced facilities if needed.

Education breaks the cycle of modern slavery

While many people would like to think that slavery was a tragedy of the past, the truth is that it still exists today, with up to 46 million people enslaved worldwide.



[The Rotarian Action Group Against Slavery](#) (RAGAS) has a strategy for fighting this horrible problem, working at the local level. Says Carol Hart Metzker, a member of the action group. "Maybe slavery won't be solved in my lifetime, but in two more years,

we're going to have a whole hamlet free."

In a village in northeastern India, the action group is tackling the problem of debt bondage. With the help of 13 clubs, a district grant through the Rotary Club of Binghamton, New York, USA, and other sources, the action group is providing \$36,000 toward the work of [Schools4Freedom](#), a project of the organization Voices4Freedom. Schools4Freedom works with local partner organization [Manav Sansadhan Evam Mahila Vikas Sansthan](#) (MSEMVS) to battle debt bondage.



The RAGAS project will support the efforts in one of those villages for three years. Poverty, illiteracy, innumeracy, and natural disasters that destroy crops or homes can leave villagers vulnerable to debt bondage in rural villages.

"When people don't have enough to eat, and they barely have the ability to keep a roof over their head and their family quite literally alive, they will often turn to whatever means are possible for survival," Metzker says.

Families may seek an arrangement with a business owner, who asks them to sign a contract that they can't read and therefore can't understand, and they inadvertently trade their freedom for survival, she says. "The slaveholder creates a scheme such that the interest is more than the family ever makes so no money really changes hands, and the family gets further and further into debt," Metzker says. "That contract is never paid off." Hundreds of thousands of people in Uttar Pradesh and the neighboring state of Bihar are working in forced labor in industries including agriculture, domestic servitude, commercial sex, stone quarries, or brick kilns, says Bhanuja Sharan Lal, director of MSEMVS.



The Schools4Freedom project establishes a school, including funding for two teachers. Children receive school supplies and three years of hot lunches. The village gets a computer to document the project. A solar light is installed in the village to help protect children from snakebites and help prevent sexual assault against women. Women are trained in a trade.

"What's so amazing about Schools4Freedom is that one removes all of these vulnerabilities," Metzker says. "You strengthen the people and then you teach them that they have basic rights so that they can go and, in a sense, demand that freedom themselves." Additionally, liberated villages are connected to a network of other freed villages, to continue supporting one another, says Peggy Callahan, co-founder of Voices4Freedom.

The problem of debt bondage is insidious because it can entrap multiple generations. But with the project efforts, "not only will these people be free and educated and able to build a life of dignity, but their children and grandchildren and great-grandchildren will be born in freedom," Callahan says.

"Someday, there is going to be such a huge difference because we realized there really is something you can do," she says. "And we did it" Metzker stated.

The Rotary Foundation and clubs invest in our future leaders and philanthropists by funding scholarships for undergraduate and graduate study.

Paul Harris Report

Foundation Points...What are they? How do you accrue them?
What do you do with them?



What are they? When a donation is made to the Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund or Polio Plus, the donor is awarded recognition points. The donor receives one point for each and every US dollar contributed. Points are also awarded to an individual for a sponsorship of a Rotary Foundation Grant.

What can be done with the Foundation Points?

Once \$1,000 has been donated and 1000 points have been accumulated, you can make someone else a Paul Harris Fellow. You might recognize a family member or community service volunteer. You can also donate smaller amounts of at least 100 points to others to help them become a Paul Harris Fellow or a multiple Paul Harris Fellow.

How do you do this? Simply fill out a Recognition and Transfer Form (102-en-(518)). Once points are transferred, they are listed in the recipient Donor Recognition Report but cannot be reused by the recipient. You can find out how many points you have by logging into Rotary.org, signing into My Rotary and accessing Membership and Foundation Reports. Then click on Donor History Report to see both your total contributions and point totals.

Another way to use your Foundation Points is to offer to donate points to other club members in the same amount that they have donated to The Rotary Foundation. This can help them become a Paul Harris Fellow or move up to an additional level of Paul Harris Fellow. Just remember, donated points do not count towards reaching Major Donor Level. Major Donor is only reached with a cumulative personal outright contribution total of at least \$10,000.
