# **Rotary and Polio Fact Sheet**

#### Polio

Poliomyelitis (polio) is a paralyzing and potentially fatal disease that still threatens children in some parts of the world. The poliovirus invades the nervous system and can cause total paralysis in a matter of hours. It can strike at any age but mainly affects children under five. Polio is incurable but completely vaccine-preventable.

#### **PolioPlus**

In 1985, Rotary International launched its <u>PolioPlus</u> program, the first initiative to tackle global polio eradication through the mass vaccination of children. Rotary International has contributed more than \$1.3 billion and countless volunteer hours to immunize more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries. In addition, Rotary International's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by donor governments to contribute more than \$9 billion to the effort.

### **Global Polio Eradication Initiative**

The <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, formed in 1988, is a public-private partnership that includes Rotary International, the <u>World Health Organization</u>, the <u>U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention</u>, <u>UNICEF</u>, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Gavi, and governments of the world. Rotary International's focus is advocacy, fundraising, volunteer recruitment, and awareness-building.

## **Polio Today**

Today, only two countries have not yet stopped the transmission of the wild poliovirus: Afghanistan and Pakistan. Less than 705 polio cases were confirmed worldwide in 2021, which is a reduction of more than 98 percent since the 1980s when the world saw about 1,000 cases per day.

## Challenges

The polio cases represented by the remaining two percent are the most difficult to prevent, due to factors including geographical isolation, poor public infrastructure, armed conflict, and cultural barriers. Until polio is eradicated, all countries remain at risk of outbreaks. Polio is one airplane flight away as demonstrated by the recent case in New York, where an unvaccinated man contracted the polio virus which was traced back to Pakistan.

# **Ensuring Success**

Every dollar Rotary International commits to polio eradication will be matched two-to-one by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation up to \$50 million a year (for a total of \$150M) through 2024. These funds help to provide much-needed operational support, medical personnel, laboratory equipment, and educational materials for health workers and parents. Governments, corporations, and private individuals all play crucial roles in funding.

## **Rotary International in Action**

More than one million Rotarians have donated their time and personal resources to end polio. Every year, hundreds of Rotarians work side-by-side with health workers to vaccinate children in polio-affected countries. Rotarians work with UNICEF and other partners to prepare and distribute mass communication tools to reach people in areas isolated by conflict, geography, or poverty. Rotarians also recruit fellow volunteers, assist with transporting the vaccine, and provide other logistical support.

# 'This Close' Campaign

Rotary International has a growing roster of public figures and celebrities participating in its "This Close" public awareness campaign, including Bill Gates, Archbishop Desmond Tutu, actress Archie Panjabi, action star Jackie Chan, golf legend Jack Nicklaus, and South Korean pop star Psy. These ambassadors help educate the public about polio through public service announcements, social media, and public appearances.
