

CHEESE + ROTARIANS = TOUR

In late November coming to us to sell cheese (by the way the cheese was great!) was the Batesburg-Leesville Rotary Club in the personage of Rotarian Andy Shumpert of that Club. In conversation with Andy he stated he lived within a stone's throw of the North Edisto River and the nearby historic abandoned Edisto Academy (1915-1935, 121 students, co-ed boarding high school and one year college). That perked the interest of a historian in our Club and a tour was organized recently to tour eastern Aiken County. Four of our Rotarians (Newburn, Shields, Zaloudek, and Selfie) and two wives, took off on a six hour, 103 mile circuit of eastern Aiken County to hit many of the natural and historic spots. Among some interesting sites seen and visited were Pascalinia, Sheik Mo's horse property, Gopher Tortoise Preserve, South Edisto River, Revolutionary War Dean Swamp Battle site, chittlin' Salley, Brodie's Heritage Preserve, Perry Hotel, Wagener's wagons, abandoned Seivern town area, North Edisto River, Edisto Academy site, New Holland, Chinquapin Falls (a natural 30 foot waterfall in our county), Janet Harrison Carolina Bay, George Washington slept here site, and the original ridge spring. The tour lunched at Juniper (build it they will come!) and took in the Nut House, both in Ridge Spring. The tour returned to Aiken via way of Mt. Calvary (1828), headwaters of the South Edisto, old mill pond, and the Seigler house in Eureka. Rotarians absorbed an interesting part of Aiken County that is somewhat little known and often overlooked. Rotarians on the tour also learned that the peach town of Monetta is half in Aiken County and half in Saluda County. It was a good day had by some Rotarians.
