Betty Ryburg introduced last week's program speaker, Larry Comegys, who is President of the Executive Board for the Aiken Land Conservancy (ALC). The ALC is a private, non-profit organization that is dedicated to preserving open, undeveloped space in Aiken County. ALC is one of 1700 land trusts in the United States and one of 20 land trusts in South Carolina. ALC preserves land

through land donations and conservation easements from landowners. Those land donations and conservation easements include the Winthrop Polo Field, Foxchase, Carolina Bay Nature Reserve, and Talatha Gardens.

One of the challenges that the Aiken area faces, according to Comegys, is increasing development pressures, which must be addressed by the community to ensure that Aiken preserves as much of its ecological habitat as possible. Through ALC's efforts and its mission of preserving open land, the natural character of Aiken County will continue for the long-term benefit and the enjoyment of the public.
