

Helpline 2-1-1 was started 38 years ago as the after hours support for Barnwell Mental Health. Now they have access to 4,200 services local, state, and nationwide. 2-1-1 also helps alleviate nonemergency calls from going to 9-1-1 and additionally provide crisis intervention for those struggling with suicidal thoughts, domestic violence, or child abuse.

CLASSIFICATION INFORMATION

When a new member is inducted into a Rotary Club, he is loaned a classification designation from that Rotary Club's Classification list. A Classification Committee has slotted each new prospect into a specific classification from that Club's list. Rotary International allows each Rotary Club to come up with their own Classification list based on businesses and professions of that particular area. Our Rotary Classification list has 376 different classifications ranging alphabetically from Accounting to YMCA Administrator. The list of course contains 374 other classifications between A to Z, including some specific only to the Aiken area-- namely Nuclear, Kaolin, and Equine. Surely, probably no other Rotary Club in the World will include those three classifications in its list.

In our Club your classification is noted on your name badge and you may retain that classification as long as you are a member of this Club, even though you might change careers or positions. However, if a person desires to have his classification changed for whatever reason, there is a specific process involved. A formal request to the Classification Committee in writing or e-mail must occur and then the Committee will act upon that request, changing the designated classification on the Classification list. Also the Secretary of the Club will generally issue a new name badge, at an approximate cost of \$10 per badge, plus the changing of club and RI records. So there is a considerable amount of detailed work involved in changing one's classification.

Classification was one of the founding precepts of Rotary as advocated by its founder, Paul Harris. In fact, that is perhaps where Rotary got its name as Paul Harris had designated the early year's meetings to rotate between the offices of different men of different professions and businesses. By rotaring around, in addition to the fellowship, members could learn the different vocations and interests of a diverse membership.
