Bill Rodgers




William (Bill) Rodgers, the Club's first "88" to be highlighted, was born in Martinsburg, W. VA. After completing High



PROGRAM LAST WEEK

Rotarian Betty Ryberg introduced speaker Tom Lex, Chairman of the Aiken County Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee. Mr. Lex presented an insightful presentation on the path to a bicycle friendly city. Tom expressed his passion for cycling and has bicycled in 38 states and internationally. Tom explained that SC ranks number 47 in the ranking of bicycle

friendly States by the League of American Bicyclists. He highlighted the numerous studies documenting the benefits to a city being bicycle friendly including economic, livability and health benefits. Tom explained the Bicycle Pedestrian Plan that was developed by Alta Planning and covers the Urbanized Areas of Aiken County. This plan was approved by the SC Community of Augusta Regional Transportation (ARTS) in August 2012 and was endorsed by the City of Aiken Council Resolution in November of that year. As part of this plan the Aiken County Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee is focusing on 5 current initiatives. These initiatives include: a bicycle system connecting USCA to Downtown Aiken, Implementation of next priorities for Share the Lane and bike lanes, Law enforcement education, public education, and pedestrian cross walks. Tom expressed that with community support of these projects the City of Aiken will benefit from implementing the Aiken County Urbanized Area Bicycle Pedestrian Plan and it will improved the overall health of Aiken County residents.
