

PROGRAM LAST WEEK by Mallory Holley



On Monday, September 17, 2018, Tray Traxler, the Aiken County School District Chief Officer of Finance, spoke to the club about the Aiken County School Districts finances. The school district is responsible for the education of 25,000 students and it is the 8th largest district in the state. The district also has 3200 full time equivalents and the total annual budget is over 300 million. The finances of the school district include

The finances of the school district include many different buckets of money. Tray described the finances as similar to having separate bank accounts with separate rules and regulations for each one. Six different funds /buckets of money exist and they include the General Fund, Special Revenue Fun, Capital Projects, Debt Service, Food Service/ Enterprise Funds and Student Activity. The Student Activity fund is the only bucket of money that is budgeted at the school level, instead of the district level. Tray incorporated questions or "quizzes" throughout his presentation. The first quiz was a true or false question. True or false, the majority of the district's funding comes from local sources- False. 49% of funding comes from the state, 43% of funding comes from local sources (property taxes and sales taxes) and 8% of the funding comes from the federal government.

Tray ended with another True or False question. True or false, the districts capital projects are funded entirely by local funds- True. As it relates to local funds, Tray also covered the Aiken Property taxes vs other areas of South Carolina. Aiken's total millage is 166 mills vs the state average of 227 mills. The budget process for the 2013/2014 school year was the last time the millage rate for Aiken was increased.
