HISTORICAL BACKGROUND: ROTARY INTERNATIONAL'S 4-WAY TEST

In the early 1930's, Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor, an accomplished business leader, devout Christian, and later RI President 54-55, was charged with turning around a failing aluminum distribution company. The company had 250 employees and most lost hope.

He first determinded what the employees needed was a policy that reflected high ethics and morals God would want in any business. He believed sincerenly that if the employees were to think right, they would do right. After considerable research failed to come up with the words that he felt appropriate, he turned to prayer and then wrote what we know as the 4-Way Test of the things we think, say and do.

The test was adopted by RI in the 1940s and has remained unchanged since then. Rotarians repeat the test all over the world at every Rotary function. It serves as a constant reminder of the high ethical standard required of all Rotarians in the business dealings, and yes, in all non-business actions as well.



New Ellenton Middle has a STEAM program and Jackson Middle has a STEM program. The curriculum is set up in a way that Science, Technology, (Arts), and Mathematics are integrated into all diciplines of study. Studies have found that a STEM focus is important to our economic future, particularly as it relates to jobs. STE(A)M provides relevance to learning, reinforces critical thinking skills, establishes team-oriented "real world" problem solving skills, promotes acceleration and remediation, and increases opportunities for underrepresented groups. Both schools are actively creating a STE(A)M Ecosystem that will include volunteers and experts, contributions, and other assistance like tutoring and after school programs.
