

PROGRAM LAST WEEK

Introduced by Tom Hallman, Chancellor Emeritus, USC Aiken, Dr. Sandra Jordan, Chancellor, USC Aiken, updated the club on the University's growth and advancements in a historical context.

Beginning with USCA's founding with 139 students in 1961, and located in Banksia, the

winter colony mansion which is now the historical museum, Dr. Jordan provided statistics that highlighted the differences that existed then as compared to now. She said that in the early years only 1 in 10 students attended college and that those attending were mostly white males. Today, Latinos are the fastest growing group attending colleges, and the majority of students are women.

USC Aiken awarded its first degrees, Associates Degrees, in 1968. Bachelor degrees were added in the 1970s, and Masters in the '90s. Today, the offerings continue to expand with the MBA degree to be launched next fall.

Currently, USCA has 3,300 students and a faculty of 226, some of who have been nationally recognized for their research contributions to various areas of study, including oceanic and psychology. Its tuition is \$3,000 below the national average, and for 16 years it has received a national ranking by U.S. News & World Report, with 9 of those years ranked #1 in the South. Additionally, the campus has been designated as "Military Friendly."

She stated that USCA has 14,000 alumni, and that 88% of the student body is from South Carolina.

CLASSIFICATION TALK: BARBARA NELSON

Barbara Nelson, President & CEO of SPCA Albrecht Center for Animal Welfare, gave the classification talk. Barbara was born and educated in Massachusetts where she received the degree, B.S., Wildlife

Biology. Early in her career she was employed by the US Forest Service in Bishop, California to do research on Wild Horses and Burros in the Inyo National Forest. Later, she was with the US Fish and Wildlife Service in Iowa, where she conducted research on Wood Duck populations. Eventually, she was appointed to serve on the Iowa DNR by then Governor, Terry Branstad.

She later made a career change and began sculpting realistic bird art in wood and later, bronze. For her wood sculpting, she received Second and Third Place, Best in the World at the Ward Foundation World Championships. She has served on the boards of two animal shelters, and has been involved in fox hunting, and show jumping.

Barbara's classification is Social Agency – Animal Welfare. She has a strong belief that her soul is here on earth to do good deeds and to do her best, and to depart this world leaving it a better place than when she arrived.
