



Rotarian Owen Clary introduced speaker Mark van der Linden from Aiken County Parks, Recreation, and Tourism to discuss Horse Creek and Langley Pond. Owen provided a brief overview of the history of the 35-mile long

stretch, with the first damming of the creek in 1845 to establish the Graniteville Mill and the 1868 damming that created Langley Pond and supported the industry of 13 textile towns. Mark noted that the 285-acre Langley Pond now supports kayaking, rowing, walking, and riding. Langley Pond served as training ground for the 1996 US Olympics rowing teams, as well as those from other countries. Several improvements are planned over the next several years. He also updated the status of the pond's leak, noting they continue to lower the pond level to find the source but that the leak is quite small, though they continue 24-hour monitoring.



HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

In last week's rapid fire and strictly timed introduction of Horse Creek and the speaker, Mark van der Linden, several points relative to Horse Creek may have been lost in the translation or the transition or fell upon quizzical ears as yours truly spat out some tonguetwisting facts on that geological anomaly of a waterway. So, here (hear): Horse Creek rises from a spring near the Federal prison in Edgefield County and flows for 35 miles into the Savannah below Augusta; the largest tributary is Sand River which flows out of Hitchcock Woods and then joins the Creek at Warrenville; the back-to-back towns on the Creek are Vaucluse, Graniteville, Madison, Stiefeltown, Warrenville, Mixville, Gloverville, Langley, Burnettown, Lynwood, Bath, Johnstown, and Clearwater--with Burnettown being the only incorporated town of the thirteen; Bath Pond, once as large as Langley Pond, was destroyed when the Bath dam broke during the floods of 1929--remnants of that dam are still visible along the Creek at Bath; the two textile companies, United Merchants and Graniteville Company, were Aiken County's largest employers until the coming of SRS in the 1950's--some 7000 employees; titanium was mined along the Creek near Clearwater in the 1960's; Edgefield Pottery, using the kaolin found in Horse Creek Valley, was made chiefly at the Miles and the Landrum potteries located on the Creek above Vaucluse, in Aiken County, and not in Edgefield County; Little Horse Creek joins Horse Creek at Clearwater; a colony of French Huguenots settled on the Creek at Vaucluse in the 1820' and 30's and named the town after their hometown; granite was mined along the Creek and was used in the construction of mills, dams, and houses; there is a nomenclature error on the SC DOT sign at Madison where the Chalk Bed Road crosses the Creek; and Horse Creek is a great

place to kayak!
