

PROGRAM LAST WEEK by John Lindsay



Describing the merger of Dominion Energy and SCANA as the "most complicated transaction ever seen". Dan Weekly, Vice President of Southern Operations for Dominion Energy, returned to the Aiken Rotary Club to outline the impacts of the merger agreement fashioned after extensive legislative and regulatory attention. Weekly recalled that after the July, 2017 announcement that construction of the two new nuclear generating facilities in South Carolina was to be discontinued. "everybody was mad." The initial Dominion merger proposal to refund approximately \$1000.00 to each typical residential customer gained critical statewide attention.

Extensive legislative and regulatory hearings narrowed the focus to "refunds verses rates". While refunds were appealing to many residents, it became clear that reduction in electricity and natural gas rates promised the best return for the long-term interests of South Carolina residents and industry. Without the significant 15% reduction created by the merger, South Carolina could not be competitive with the energy rates in the neighboring states of North Carolina, Georgia and Florida causing a long termnegative economic development impact. The state made the right decision, he said. The Dominion Energy executive said the 15% rate reduction will result in reduced monthly energy bills for average household usage. Weekly says Dominion has much to learn from the quality of SCANA day-to-day operations and that signs of change can be expected soon.

HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

10 YEARS AGO - JANUARY 2009

2009 marked the 50th anniversary of the Student Loan/Scholarship Fund, Rotary Club of Aiken. For 50 years, Rotarians and non Rotarians have contributed to the fund with the understanding that their contribution would be used exclusively to assist local high school seniors obtain a college education. That year the Fund allowed the Fund Committee to award

\$15,000 in scholarships.

The Sergeant at Arms thought they would "pull one" by adding a chair to one of the more popular tables. That table remains very popular to this day and sometimes has even more than 9 chairs around it!

Marti Healy presented to the Club her book "Antiques in the Heart of Aiken" which is a historical guide and fundraising effort to benefit the Aiken Center for the Arts. She gave a

brief history of the Aiken Center for the Arts which was founded in 1972 by artists Pat Koelker and Nancy Wilds at the Rose Hill Estate and called the Rose Hill Arts Center. In 1993, the Center moved to its current location on Laurens Street and was renamed Aiken Center for the Arts. This year marks the 20th year of the Aiken Antique show which runs January 31st - February 3rd.

20 Years Ago - January 1999

Aiken Rotarians Scott Hunter, Rick Osbon and Barbara Strack were involved with the opening of a free medical clinic sponsored by Area Churches Together Serving (ACTS). The Acts of Caring Clinic opened for business in December 1998 with the mission to serve the medically indigent residents of Aiken County. It is now the Community Medical Clinic of Aiken County with Rotarian Jamie Mothkovich as the Executive Director.

Our newest member in January of 1999 was Roger Le Duc, who had just recently been appointed as City Manager. Roger served as Aiken's Director of Public Works and Economic Development for 12 years before becoming City Manager. He served our city for almost 25 years. He was also the first recipient of the coveted Richard Pearce Truly Great American Award!
