

Our guest from the February 11, 2019 meeting was Hartley Powell from the SC Department of Revenue. Many responsibilities falls under the DOR. For example, issuing retail licenses, collecting taxes, along with collecting monies for 72 taxes and fees. Mr. Hartley gave us an over view of where and how his department is running. This included items such as when most of could expect a tax refund to South Carolina's law suit with Amazon.

Last year this department processed 1.6 million individual refunds. The average refund was \$967. In regards to tax refund, one of the reasons we may see is delay is the enormous

increase of tax fraud. The IRS expects refund fraud to hit \$21 billion this year, up from \$6.5 billion two years ago. Mr. Hartley was able to give us information how the DOR is trying to combat this issue. One of the best ways he sees to fight against fraud is to move the department to all electronic and move away form paper. He went on tell us about the issue of collecting sales tax for goods sold on-line. One of the major contributors is Amazon, Mr. Powell stated that South Carolina has been in litigation with Amazon along with other states, Arizona, Minnesota, Washington, New Jersey and North Dakota, Mr. Powell made it clear that he didn't feel as though his department was being greedy, he iust feels like Amazon needs to pay their fair share. Brick and mortar stores have to, and requiring on-line companies do the same just keeps the playing field fair.

HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

HAPPY ANNIVERSARY TO US!

Anniversaries are always a time for celebration and we have good reason to celebrate as our Rotary Club commemorates its founding eighty years ago this coming Wednesday, February 27th. Sponsored by the Augusta Rotary Club, sixteen of Aiken's leading citizens gathered at the Commercial Hotel and held their first meeting as a Rotary Club on February 27, 1939. They elected Benjamin King (**Bill Howell's** uncle and the Publisher of the Aiken Standard) as the club's first President. At its "Charter Presentation Exercises" held on March 30, 1939, the club members received our official charter (discovered in a yard sale in more recent times) and had various items of club property (bell, gavel, banner, flags, song books, etc.) presented by Rotary Clubs from Augusta, Columbia, Charleston, Waynesboro, and Orangeburg. The evening concluded with music provided by "Elmer Snowden and his Society Orchestra and Entertainers." We held anniversary banquets at our 50th anniversary in 1989 and again five years ago for our 75th anniversary. A special 80th anniversary event is planned for later in the spring although it is unlikely that Elmer Snowden is still performing. Stay tuned for details.

Anniversaries are also a time for reflection. A quick review of our archives shows that most of Aiken's prominent citizens and civic leaders have graced the membership roster of this Club in the last eighty years. Our charter members stepped away from their daily lives to fight in World War II, returned to their occupations and professions, raised their families, and substantially contributed to the progress made by the Aiken community. As the years went by, they encouraged others to join the club who carried the torch as we gradually lost our charter members to the passage of time. Our club has helped educate our community's children, first through a Student Loan Program started with a \$500 war bond and now with a generous and growing Scholarship Fund. We have contributed to Rotary International's fight to eradicate polio from the world and taken on Alzheimer's disease through the CART fund. Along the way, we have introduced high school students to Rotary, cleaned the side of local roadways, rung the bells for the Salvation Army, and performed countless daily tasks of kindness and generosity to those in need on a local, national, and international level. We have contributed three District Governors to Rotary International and sponsored the establishment of the North Augusta and Aiken Sunrise clubs as well as Rotaract and Interact Clubs.

Eighty years is a long time and yet it should only be the beginning of many decades of further service to our community and the world. A glance at our old club directories reveals how quickly our membership changes through death, resignations, and relocations from the community. We need to always be vigilant for talented, energetic, and committed members who will carry on the legacy of service and progress that those who have gone before entrusted to us.
