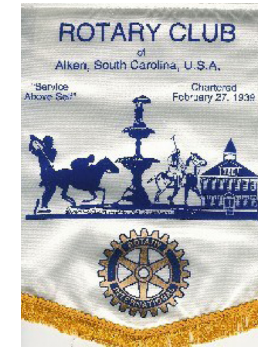

PROGRAM LAST WEEK by Mallory Holley



On Monday, July 16th, Dr. Louis Peak and Heather Raynack spoke with the club about joint replacement surgeries and Aiken Regional's inpatient rehabilitation facility. Dr. Peak, a local orthopedic surgeon, shared with the club about the options for joint replacements for the new generation of patients. There are currently 1 million knee replacements and 400,000 hip replacements performed every year and medical professionals are expecting exponential growth. The growth is a result of younger people choosing surgery (45 to 64 year olds) to maintain their active lifestyles and because there is more information about surgery options. Dr. Peak said conservative treatments still exist and are a first step, but arthritis is progressive and the conservative treatments may not be enough as time goes on. As far as hip replacements, technological

improvements have helped address the fit and stability of new hips. The new implants come in a variety of different sizes and materials. Knee replacement and resurfacing technology has also improved. Dr. Peak prefers a Stryker's single-radius design that includes improved bearing technology and allows for increase flexion of the knee. Resurfacing is also an option for candidates that have pain isolated to one part of the knee. Some other new products have also made the recovery easier- Aquacel dressings, Aquamantys System and Bipolar Sealers, Computer Assisted surgery and MAKO plasty solutions. Rehab is a big part of recovery from hip and knee replacement and Heather Raynack shared with us the Rehab Services available through Aiken Regional Medical Centers. In November of 2017, a new inpatient rehab center opened and includes 14 beds within the hospital. Patient therapy plans are developed and patients traditionally spend about 3 hours in therapy a day. Typically, the patients admitted for inpatient services have suffered a stroke, trauma, neurological complication or spinal cord injury. For outpatient services, patients are sent to the Hitchcock Healthcare facility at the Village at Woodside and any pediatric patients seeking OT, PT or Speech therapy are seen at the Hitchcock Building on the campus of Aiken Regional Medical Centers.
