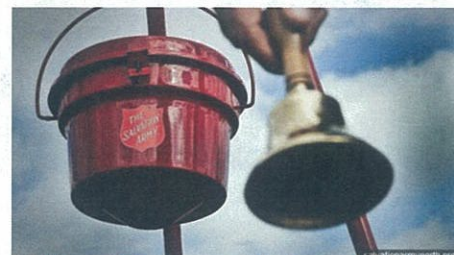

PROGRAM LAST WEEK by Tara Reeder



Last week's speaker was Rotarian and State Senator Tom Young. Senator Young give the club an update of what's going on in the South Carolina Legislation for the upcoming session. The political tone in Columbia is much different than Washington, says Senator Young. The failure of this project took of most of the South Carolina's legislation time over the last year. The legislators will continue to address the fall out from the VC summer Project and will also be seeking other expansion on with solar. There is a \$1.044 Billion surplus. \$497.7 million of that being recurring funds. They have

many ideas for the surplus. Some of them being adding additional school resource officers, tax relief and higher education and other K-12. The legislations will continue to bridge local industry and business with education.

In the presentation Mr. Young also shared that they will address ethic, such as dark money disclosures. They will continue to work on a bill to ban the use of a hand held cell phone while driving and they hope to make ground on being able to speeding up how funds are distributed after a major weather event.

Senator Young also had positive news to share when it comes to commerce for South Carolina. Nearly 8,000 jobs were announced in 2018. 25% of those jobs added were in tier 4 counties with the lowest capita income. More than \$3.3 billion in capital investments in 2018. The 2019 session will begin January 8.
