What do Rotarians really do?

Then I thought about me and many of you, my friends in Rotary, and how we care for children and their families. Many of us are business owners and advocate for our customers; many advocate for others through their daily business activities. Whatever the case for most of us, we advocate for others. That's why we joined Rotary. To quote Mother Theresa, "We cannot all do great things, but we can do small things with great love. Be someone to somebody."

In Rotary, many of us advocate for children in remote parts of the world whom we will never see.

- Children who live thousands of miles away in a world without safe water.
- ♦ Girls who go to a school and have no desks, no benches, no chalkboards.
- Children who have yet to be immunized against polio.

Let's take a moment to think about those children. At best, from a distance, we can be the voice for those children. Without our voice on their behalf, those children may die of waterborne illnesses. Without our voice, they may never learn to read or may end up unable to walk without the use of crutches etc. As a Rotarian in the service of others, do those children hear your voice?

So, here's the question: Why did you join Rotary? Why did you become a Rotarian? Why do you care so much about other people?

I'm thinking that it may be because sometime, somewhere, someone in your life was a person who cared about you and was the champion in your life, or perhaps the cheerleader who encouraged you, or maybe your mentor. Whoever that person may be, he or she made you believe that you were special and uniquely talented.

Who was that person? Was it a relative? Was it the person who asked you to join Rotary? I'm certain that you see that person right now in your mind's eye. And even if it wasn't said this directly, you can hear that person say, "To whom much is given, much is expected." Whoever that person may be, you can be that person to someone else.

Through Rotary's Foundation you have the opportunity to financially support activities that will be the voice for those children. Your district and your club have the opportunity to submit grants that will give them opportunities for better lives.

Have you ever heard the voice of a child in need? Have you ever felt the need to reach out a helping hand? Has your district or club considered a global or district grant?

We made a promise the day we became a Rotarian and first put on a Rotary pin. We promised to be honest and ethical. We promised to help others where and how we were able. We promised to do what we could to help make the world a better place. We promised, in short, to put Service Above Self.




#### SHOW OUR IMPACT
