
IN THE BEGINNING: ROTARY INTERNATIONAL WAS ESTABLISHED IN CHICAGO IN 1905



On 23 February 1905, Paul P. Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram E. Shorey gathered in Loehr's office for what would become known as the first Rotary club meeting. Harris' desire for camaraderie among business associates brought together these four men and eventually led to an international organization of service and fellowship.

We have just received the application papers for the election of the Rotary Club of Sequim, Washington, to membership in Rotary International but before sending it on to the Board of Directors, there are some irregularities which we should get in order, thereby saving time.

Constitution and By-Laws: Page 0, Article V, Territorial Limits: All that is necessary here is the name of the town, vtz: Sequim, Washington the note following this section will be sufficient to cover the proper territorial limits of the club.

Page 11, By-Laws - Article I - Election of Directors and Officers: There are two plans given in this Article, as in Articles II and IV. If the plan in the right hand column is adopted, then the plan in the left hand column of each of these Articles should be crossed out. We note that the plan in the right hand column in both Articles II and IV has been adopted, but in Article I the first plan has been adopted and the alternate plan has been crossed out. We take it that from the list of the Board of Directors and Officers as given on the Application form, they propose to follow the alternate plan, which means the nomination of Officers and two Board members at the regular meeting one month prior to the annual meeting. If this is the case, please have them cross out the plan in the left hand column and adopt the plan in the right hand column.

Cherter List: On the charter list we note the names of Archie Taylor, Kirby Smith and Harry Alexander as representing the U. S. Government in some form of education. Please determine if each of these non represent independent services to the community, or if they are from the same institution in the community. We take it that Archie Taylor's classification should be that of "Mational Government - Indian Service" under the major classification of GOVERNMENT. Is this correct?

There is not enough information given in the cases of Kirby Smith and Harry Alexander to indicate just what their government service is, so we are asking you to furnish us with the necessary information.












Number 2 house, on Horizon View, is a 3-bedroom, and was sold by Mary Lou KuyKendall, of Ranch Realty.



Cooperative House Building Project with SHS Carpentry Class and Rotarians from 1974 to 1984










