Level 9: \$5,000,000 to \$9,999,999

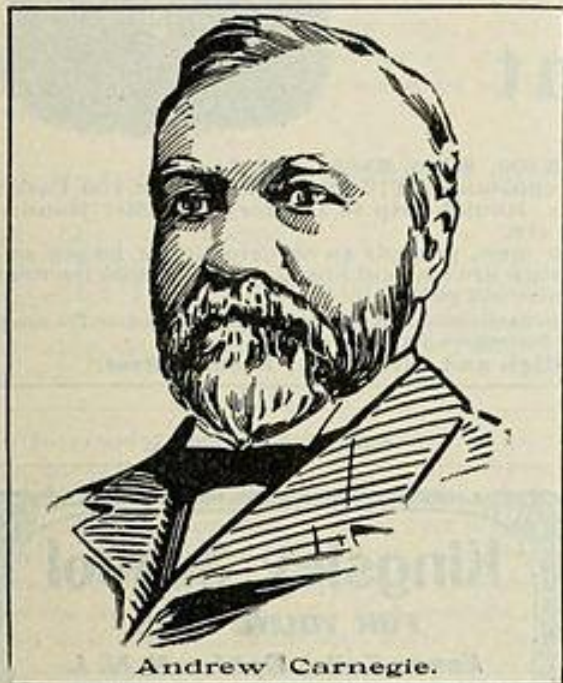

THE munificence of Andrew Carnegie has led to the establishment of Public Libraries throughout the country. These positions are open to only one person in each town. It will be necessary, therefore, for any reader of this notice who may be interested to make application *at once*. Such an opportunity to secure a permanent and desirable position is seldom offered.
