We are partnering with Marshall Family Resource Center to provide resources through 2 resource Fairs, a holiday food give away and a stocked resource closet at each of our sites. We are a locally based, private non-profit organization that serves low and moderate income residents of Humboldt County. RCAA offers a wide range of services, from crisis intervention, financial literacy services, AFACTR community service placements, shelter and housing services to high-risk youth; from natural resource and energy projects, to providing comprehensive care and transitional housing for families with minor children, and long term permanent supportive housing projects for adults and their households.
Jan-25	Neuwood community Action Agency	,2,230	We would use the awarded funds to procure items needed for the families we serve in our transitional living program for families with minor children. These items of necessity include: bed pillows, full and twin size bedding/linens, 2-3x full size mattresses and required bed boards, hand/face/body towels, and additionally we need to replace outdated children's car seats and booster seats. The families that will directly benefit from this funding are in the process of reunification through Child Welfare Services, and are working towards stabilization, increasing their natural supports and community memberships, and reclaiming their lives. HFSC's vision is to create a healthier and more resilient community where individuals and families are empowered to thrive, relationships are strengthened, and mental well-being is prioritized and accessible for all. HFSC provides over 16,000 counseling sessions per year to 350 children, teens, adults, couples, and families. The agency also has one of the only training programs working to build a stronger mental health infrastructure and healthier future for Humboldt County residents. Mental health needs in Humboldt County continue to rise, and according to the most recent Community Health Assessment, Humboldt County had a suicide mortality rate that is 2.4 times that of California in 2020, and suicide is the leading cause of death in Humboldt County for people aged 15 to 24.  Grant funds will be used for office furniture and therapy supplies, allowing our counselors to provide services in person again (as opposed to telehealth only) and meet the surging demand for mental health services in our community. Our facility underwent extensive repair due to mold damage. However, none of the office furniture was salvageable due to extensive mold damage and without furniture, counselors cannot see clients in the building. Returning to in-person services will help us reduce current waitlists, align with Medi-cal referral preferences, increase our client base, maintain our commitment to accessible services, and enhance our training program as trainee clinicians want in-person training experience.
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Nov-24	North Coast Rape Crisis Team	\$1,000	The North Coast Rape Crisis Team (NCRCT) strives to create a culture of safety, solidarity, and support for all who are affected by sexualized violence by empowering survivors. NCRCT utilizes HEAL: Helping survivors by meeting them where they are at. Empowering them through their healing journey, Affirming their choices, and Listening and believing their truth. As a local nonprofit agency, we directly support our community in the form of prevention and intervention services. Our Education team works with local schools throughout Humboldt County to provide age-appropriate lessons to students to prevent harm. Our Advocates respond 24 hours a day, seven days a week to the hospital, law enforcement and courts to support families through the often-lengthy process of the criminal justice system. We provide individual and group peer counseling to survivors and those who love them, regardless of when the harm happened. Our 24-hour crisis line receives over 1,000 calls a year from those affected by sexualized violence in Humboldt County. The team at NCRCT serves survivors regardless of gender identity, ability/disability, sexuality, ethnicity and income level. Our doors are open to those who are harmed today or many years ago.  These funds will be utilized to create three awareness banners to be hung in Eureka from the end of January to the beginning of April. These banners will bring awareness of our services to the greater Eureka area as well as highlight our fundraising gala event occurring on April 5th. The first banner will be street banner hung up for two weeks in January across the intersection of 5th and "C" Streets. Another two fence banners will be hung mid-February until the event on L Street Fence at the Water Tower and at the Walnut & Hemlock Street Intersection. All banners will include a permanent Rotary wheel and logo.
