There's Gold in Them Thar Hills! Federal Incentives to Reduce Our Carbon Emissions

Our speaker on January 10 was Ellen Siegal, the President of Woodstork Wisdom, Inc, suggested by Nicky Lindquist of the Peregrine Team. For the past eight years, Siegel has created and taught an ongoing course called Climate Conversations 101 for the University of Miami's Osher Lifelong Learning Institute. Her firm trains presenters on climate change, developing curriculum to incorporate science, social science, communication skills, and presentation skills. Her goal is to amplify the climate conversation in the public.



Siegal gave us an overview of federal incentives to dial back, even reduce, our collective carbon emissions. This

is urgent and timely information; 2023 was the hottest year on record, likely the hottest in the last 100,000 years. Unfortunately, responses to the climate emergency have been insufficient to deal with it. In particular, it's been difficult for individuals to see how they could have an effect on such a massive problem.

Now the government has passed the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), which allocates largescale credits and deductions to fight climate change. This changes the game. Available funds total \$369 billion!

Siegal told us how to access credits and rebates that are designed to encourage renewable energy, electrification of gas and oil appliances, and weatherizing homes to reduce leakage of heat and cold, saving money and using less electricity.
