outdoor adaptive climbing nationwide. Emily has been an adaptive sports participant since age five. She played collegiate wheekhair basketball and has medaled in three Paraclimbing World Cups. Covid Update: A Post-Pandemic View

Dr. Monica Gandhi has a new book out and she is a very busy woman in her practice, specializing in virology at UCSF, so she had one reason to speak to us and probably plenty of reasons why it might have been a challenge to fit our talk into her schedule. We are lucky she did.



She opened by eliciting questions from the audience and, with the mastery of a skilled speaker, she managed to find ways to fit her

answers into her talk. Though on Zoom and across the Bay, she was among us well.

Each person in the audience has had their own encounters with COVID, and she began with one of hers $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$ that she knew from comparing the challenges faced by her patients with the relative ease of her own life (her children in private schools that stayed open), that closing all public schools for months and months has been terribly costly to the children, to their families, and to society. Her sense of the research is that closing schools did not make that much difference to the overall course of the disease.

The focus of her talk was not to place blame on anyone for the policies we did follow last time, and yet with COVID now $\hat{a}\in$ endemic, $\hat{a}\in$ a disease that is with us for the foreseeable future, we need to take a different approach. <u>Read More</u>
