Luna, we decided to name this project in honor of George and the Y agreed to give us naming rights. Many club members donated to support honoring George in this project, totaling \$7650. We applied for a District grant and were awarded \$15,000 for the dental clinic project.

How do you like 40-year-old wines? Better or worse than 30-year-old, 20-year-old, 10-year-old, or the wines you most often drink? Thirsty Thursday on March 14 featuring "dirty wine" tasting was a good place to find out.

There were 4 bottles from the 1980s, 6 from the 1990s, 6 from the 2000s, another dozen 10-year-old wines, and some current wines. Thirty-one Berkeley Rotarians and friends attended. Thanks to all who brought a bottle or snacks, who helped uncork and decant,

stayed to clean up, and even helped us hang a rug in the living room. (Gotta love tall Rotarians.) Special thanks to Schuyler Bailey who dropped off a dozen bottles of old wine, but couldn't come to the tasting because of Covid.

For wine buffs: We had folks talking about the latest research from chemists on how best to aerate wine and what kinds of wine most benefit from aeration. We compared wines from France, Italy, Slovakia, Spain, and the U.S. We lots of Cabs, Zins, and Merlots, but also Riojas, Petite Sirahs, Pinot Noirs, Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc, Cava and champagne, Barbera Rose, and varietals from abroad you might never have heard of. BART's Safe and Clean Plan

Henry Symons, the Government and Community Relations Representative for BART and a Berkeley native, spoke to the club on March 13 on BART's Safe and Clean Plan. Henry attended Berkeley public schools, and his first grade teacher, Berkeley Rotarian Marion Hunt, was in the audience. Symons is a graduate of UC Santa Cruz.



He divided his presentation into several major sections:

- 1. An overview of BART's primary ridership
- a. 35% have incomes of under \$50,000.
- b. 44% do not own a car.
- c. 67% are non-white
- 2. Commitment to clean cars and stations
- a. BART now has 66% more cleaning staff than before the pandemic
- b. More staffing at high-volume stations.
- c. Insurance that all restrooms are open throughout the day and throughout the system.
- d. The new fleet of cars are much easier to clean and are built with materials that are easier to clean and stronger for wear and tear.
