BUILDing Young Entrepreneurs

Grace Carr is a Senior Community
Engagement Manager for BUILD Bay Area, a
program that teaches entrepreneurship skills
to high school students in underserved
areas. Last week she came to the club to
show us what BUILD is and how it works.
Carr shared her presentation time with Peter,
a volunteer mentor and former senior
executive in the tech industry. BUILD is
looking for more volunteers who can foster
in students the skill to recognize customer
(and community) needs, and to find in those
needs the inspiration to build a new business.

BUILD was founded in 1999 in East Palo Alto and is now a national program, with most

students enrolled through online teaching. Over 55,000 students have participated in the program. In the East Bay, students work in person with a mentor. Many schools offer only one year of the curriculum, during which students learn to pay attention to what a customer might *need* not just to what they think is *cool*. That year also builds their entrepreneurial imagination and their sense of confidence that business might be a good fit. Students are taught "Spark†skills, essential to career success: communication, collaboration, problem-solving, innovation, grit, and self-management. Read More

Pollinator Seed Libraries Bloom

In past issues of e-Rev we have reported on Berkeley's efforts to develop gardens that attract pollinators, located throughout the city. Many club members have volunteered to weed and plant the gardens. Last year, Transition Berkeley received a club grant to create little seed libraries where gardeners can exchange seeds from their native plant gardens.
