

How do people and societies flourish? Our speaker last Wednesday, Stephen Menendian, is the Assistant Director and Director of Research of the Othering and Belonging Institute at UC Berkeley. He told us that the research is clear: The most important factor allowing people to flourish is for them to feel they really belong to a community. Unfortunately, in recent decades in America and elsewhere, opportunities for people to belong to various communities and groups have been declining. But this trend is not inevitable and has resulted not only from organic changes in society but also from conscious policy decisions that can be changed to promote contact, connection, and belonging.

People have an inherent desire to connect with other people. Societies that flourish make this connection easy to happen, *i.e.*, they encourage "centripetal" rather than "centrifugal" social forces. In the mid-20th century, there were structures in place. such as strong unions, social and religious organizations, common sources of information, densely residential-focused central cities, etc., that had centripetal effects. Gradually, towards the end of the last century and to the present time, factors such as suburbanization and car-oriented communities, fractured sources of information, decline of unions and organized religion, and the rise of a for-profit, conflict-generation industry have led to more individualization and isolation.
