Insight Housing: Growth and Challenges Ahead

The Berkeley Food and Housing Project was founded in 1970 and, staffed with volunteers, primarily served as a soup kitchen. Today, it has grown and been renamed as Insight Housing, with a mission to provide housing stability and the belief that as a housing-first organization, it should facilitate as many different support services as possible within one organization.

Last week, Rick Dean, Associate Director of Philanthropy for Insight Housing, told of the successes around their mission to ensure food, housing, and stability for low-income individuals, including veterans and people with disabilities. Over the last year, Insight Housing served over 4,309 participants; 2,200 of whom are veterans and their families. Over 105,986 meals were served. Interim and permanent supportive housing provided stability and wraparound services. Street outreach and case management connected people to critical resources. Employment and benefits helped individuals achieve financial security. There is 95% housing retention among the permanent supportive housing residents. Read More

Last week, I worked at Malcolm X Elementary School at the 7:30 AM drop-off, helping teachers Amy Cottle and Joal Arvanigian distribute bags of children's books to their parents and dispensing Peet's coffee and DreamFluff donuts while the teachers offered lots of advice about how to encourage the kids to read. Teachers these days are so dedicated! They wear jeans and sneakers instead of the pearls and heels of my youth because they have to keep up with the kids! At John Muir School, I helped reading resource coach Olivia Sanders run a book raffle during the annual May Fair, while she buttonholed the parents, all of whom she knew well, explaining this gift of books their children would bring home on the last day of class next week.

Thank you, Pamela Doolan, for coordinating all these volunteer opportunities. And thank you, Berkeley Rotarians, for providing the funds for another excellent program!






Lasagna Project Marches On
