Lisa Bullwinkel, Hoopla CEO Extraordinaire of the events management company Another Bullwinkel Show, spoke to the club on March 13 about the need for the kinds of community events she produces like the Chalk and Chocolate festival and the Persian Festival in this era of isolation. She wants to bring color to our world, color that we don t usually see when we re stuck in offices and glued to our screens. Attendance at these festivals is growing by leaps and bounds, and she thinks it s because people LIKE

getting out and rubbing shoulders with lots of people even if they re not personally interacting with them. She wants to make these experiences as interactive and experiential as she can, offering festival-goers the opportunity to be creative in a public space, whether drawing chalk masterpieces on sidewalks, painting banners, or jumping over bonfires in celebration of the Persian New Year.

Questions from club members were interesting, from concerns about unfriendly young people hunkered over their phones to comments about the new Ashby mural to queries about how she deals with grumpy neighbors and merchants and the City of Berkeley. Lisa is Chair of the Civic Arts Commission and meets with the Councilmembers regularly in her role as an arts advocate. But she�s also Co-Producer of the Kite Festival and dropped a bombshell on us all: City Waterfront staff have told her they need to cancel the Kite Festival this year, as their budget can�t handle it.
