To be able to travel to India, virtually, and administer the polio vaccine to the children was quite a gift. Brentwood Rotarians Mike and Marsha Crosby shared their incredible journey with us at our ZOOM meeting last Wednesday. Mike is the incoming Assistant Governor for the Brentwood/Antioch area. RI Director, Brad Howard, who leads a team he calls Polio Warriors, Mike and Marsha visited Delhi and Jaipur and impoverished outlying villages. They were welcomed by the people who, after 30 years, have accepted Rotarians along with local public health workers to administer the 2 drops of this life-saving vaccine to their children.

The Crosbys shared with us pictures of open sewers, garbage, and trash along the roads as they became more and more immersed in the world of polio. We saw, too, pictures of a school and hospital where, with support from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and Rotary, young people are fitted with protheses and given the ability not just to walk but also to become self-sufficient.

Mike compared the polio virus with the COVID-19 virus, lack of sanitation being a primary conduit of both diseases. There is no cure for polio, but there is a vaccine. Despite its existence, it took a global effort to reduce the countries in which polio occurs. In 1988, there were 125 endemic countries, now there are just 3 • Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Nigeria. Rotary volunteers have been at the forefront of this eradication effort. On the recent Polio National Immunization Day in India, 1.2 million people in 1100 villages were immunized.

According to the April 2020 *Support World Immunization Week* announcement, with the new challenge coming from COVID-19, the Rotary Foundation is &using the vast infrastructure developed to identify the polio virus and deliver vaccination campaigns, the polio eradication program is pitching in to protect the vulnerable from COVID-19, especially in polio-endemic countries. Thank you to Mike and Marsha for sharing their experience and giving Berkeley Rotary Club insight not only to the challenges ahead but also the possibilities.

# **Sustaining Arts During a Pandemic**

What is the role of the arts during a time of global crisis? When will audiences feel safe to go to the theater again? What does the public need and want from arts organizations?

These are only some of the questions and concerns that the Berkeley Repertory Theatre like all arts organizations are considering as they remain closed during this era of social isolation. Our April 29 speaker Johanna Pfaelzer, Artistic Director of the Berkeley Rep, shared how Berkeley's renowned and beloved theater is coping and adjusting to its new normal. As Pfaelzer states, Live theatre is uniquely dependent on artists and audiences coming together in a shared space in real time. Which is exactly what we re not supposed to be doing right now, for the health of our community.

The remainder of the Berkeley Rep \$\&\circ\$ s 2019/2020 season has been cancelled and the theater will remain dark until next winter, Pfaelzer said. Within the next month the theater will announce its new season. In the meantime, the Rep is offering some plays and performances on a live-streamed basis, a play reading group has been developed, and the School of Theater \$\&\circ\$ s programming is continuing through online classes and workshops.

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
