Why Local News Matters

Our speaker on August 14 was Lance Knobel who, along with Frances Dinkelspiel and Tracy Taylor, founded Berkeleyside, an internet-only newspaper, 10 years ago to cover local news. Local news coverage has been disappearing across the country as newspapers go out of business, not only due to the rise of the internet but also because of the elimination of Classified Adds due to Craig ts List and because most advertising now goes to Google and Facebook. Jobs have been lost and newspapers have closed.

Berkeleyside was started to remedy this situation locally. Berkeley is a large enough city with enough activities to make reporting necessary but it's not so big as to make it

impossible. It was not clear that this venture could succeed, particularly as they wanted the site to be available to everyone with no charge for the service. Now there are enough subscribers at \$5-\$15 per month to make it a going concern and the founders can now draw a salary. Initial investors also contributed to make it commercially viable. There are over 2,000 subscribers and over 30,000 users per month, so future growth is possible.

The founders of Berkeleyside believe that being informed about local news is an essential part of a functioning democracy. Residents needs to know what their school board, city government, and police are actually doing.

There is also the realization that our Bay Area is woefully short of such local papers. The energetic staff of Berkeleyside is thinking about expanding to Oakland and Richmond.

Perhaps in the future there will be a local internet newspaper in those towns as well.
