## Demographics in the U.S. and Abroad

At our club meeting on August 15, Dr. Ronald Lee, a Professor of Demography and Economics at U.C. Berkeley discussed changing demographic trends in the United States and abroad. Dr. Lee



presented a number of dynamic trends at work. The discussion centered around quantitative aspects of populations. Human populations are increased or depleted by factors such as fertility, immigration and mortality.

The human "replacement level" or the birth rate needed to maintain a constant human population is 2.1 births/woman. In the developed world, the birth rate is declining and has been below the replacement level since the last great recession. In fact the birth rate for approximately half the world's population is below the replacement level. One exception is sub-Saharan Africa where the current level is 5 births/woman.



The U.S. birth rate is now about 1.75, slightly higher than Europe's. Some of the trends which can be observed today and are expected to continue are: a rising older percentage of the population, a decreasing number of entrants into the labor force, an increasing demand for nursing homes and greater strains on financing of the Social Security system.
