Celebrating Our Scholarship Program

Last Wednesday, the club celebrated 24 years of our college scholarship program, coordinated and chaired by Tina Etcheverry. Irene Hegarty and Peter Campbell reviewed the history of the program since it was first suggested and funded by Jim Reynolds and planned in partnership with Don Alter. A video of all of our scholars since 2000 showed the impact of the program. The statistics are impressive:

- Number of BRC scholarship students since 2001: 65
- Number of BRC mentors: 34 (some serving multiple times)
- Funding received to date: Nearly \$1 million, including \$100,000 in reserve
- Percentage of BRC scholars who graduate from college: 91% (compared to 15% for students of similar circumstances)

We were introduced to several current and former scholars and heard testimonials from former scholars Cierra Simmons and Sandy Alegria (who is currently completing her Masters in Social Welfare) and from Sandyâ€[™]s mentor, Sallie Weissenger. Lychou Phey spoke by video about her struggle adjusting to college life at UC Riverside and the help she received from her mentor, Tina Etcheverry.

We also heard from Sherry Smith, Executive Director of Berkeley Community Scholars (BSC), who emphasized the importance of the partnership between the BSC High Hopes program and Berkeley Rotary since 2015. Together, the two organizations currently fund and mentor about 120 students. Staff from BSC supplement the work of volunteer mentors in providing college and career advice.

Denise Richardson, President of Berkeley Community College, spoke of the college's development from its early days as Vista College to today's urban campus with 6319 current students and a new building under construction in the downtown. More than 100 BCC students have received High Hopes community college scholarships.

Next year will be the 25th anniversary of our college scholarship program. Let's make this the best year yet by donating generously!

Front and Center at the Front Row Festival

The Downtown Berkeley Association mounted a sunny music festival last Saturday, the Front Row Festival, featuring booths from major Berkeley arts organizations, and 8 hours of non-stop music on two Shattuck Avenue stages. Remembering Candy Pierce

I was saddened to hear about the recent passing of Candy Pierce, the youngest Governor in our District 5160's history and among the first women Governors.

Candy spoke at our club multiple times besides her Governor's talk, on the Foundation, on PolioPlus, on membership outreach and retention, on project planning, and other central Rotary issues. As chair of the District's Visioning Committee, she led our club's visioning sessions that resulted in the club's first strategic plan, which our Board has reviewed and updated twice so far. (You can find it on the club website.) She was the District's head "trainer" for many years, leading sessions at District assemblies



and conferences, and leading similar session at the PETS annual conference training for Presidents and Zone institute. She helped conceive and lead the Leadership Academy, training past club presidents for District roles. If you've been to District assemblies, you probably heard her training on how to introduce a speaker or be a more effective speaker yourself.

Candy spent her professional career leading nonprofits, in the last decade focusing on youth transitioning out of foster care as Executive Director of CASA Solano County. She carried on her Rotary work most of her life as a single mom raising her daughter, who finished college recently. She had been in fine health, and so her death from Covid was a shock to her friends and those who worked with her.

She will be missed.
