The Orchid Conservation Alliance

Berkeley Rotarian Steve Beckendorf, Ph.D., a UC Berkeley Professor Emeritus of Molecular and Cell Biology, spoke enthusiastically about his experiences as a Board Member of the Orchid Conservation Alliance (OCA) on October 9. He also showed beautiful slides of rare orchids and their habitats.

Founded in 2006, the OCA promotes the conservation of orchids and orchid habitat around the world. Today, the OCA has reserves in Brazil, Ecuador, and Colombia, but is open to orchid conservation anywhere in the world. Preservation of natural orchid habitat preserves the orchids, their pollinators, their genetic diversity, and other fauna, as well as the birds, frogs, insects, reptiles, and mammals in the forests where they live.

District Interact Kickoff Last Sat. in Woodland

On Saturday, Oct. 12, the all-student District Interact Council held its kickoff of its annual program. Three club Rotarians and a friend attended. The training was different this year, focusing on how to organize multiple clubs into larger projects. Students from the high schools in contiguous areas worked together in the training and socials.

There were lots of initial interactive games to get the youth attending across the District to meet one another. This year's fundraising project, which most District Interact clubs will pursue, is raising money for the Environmental Defense Fund, reflecting the environmental concerns of the students. The service project of the day was preparing tree plants for replanting in areas hit by disasters. Those attending also had a chance to tour the large Agricultural Museum, where the event was staged. The Council reported that 62 clubs had registered with the District so far this year; they expect to have their usual total of 4000+ Ineracters across our District by the end of 2019-20. Our own club's Interact students couldn't make the kickoff, but are getting active in their project with autistic kids at Cal and in other projects.
