SAN FELIPE NEWS

Torsten Jacobsen Reports

Torsten Jacobsen and **Tineke** spent the past few weeks in San Felipe. They were there during Thanksgiving, and aside from beach walking, off-roading and partaking in art activities at the local poplado 35 km south of San Felipe, they had the opportunity to engage with our sister club at meetings and visit the Cancer Center that we established together 10 years ago. The Center serviced performed over 5000 patients, performed over 1000 mammograms and ultra sounds, and extensive screens for colon/prostate cancer.



The cancer center and programs have grown magnificently. Last year over 5000 patient were seen, over 1000 mammograms were conducted, 600 ultrasounds performed, as well as extensive screenings for colon and prostate cancer. In addition, much time and energy is expended on patient education.

The mammography instrumentation which we brought down years ago has finally met its day and been replaced by a newer albeit used unit purchased for which the center still needs to come up with \$4000. As a now well established entity, the center attracts the attention of other Rotary clubs with the result that both an audiology testing program is in place and even the Lions club evaluates and dispenses glasses at the center. The establishment of the first hospice facility anywhere in the entire Baja peninsula will have its grand opening in Mid-December.

The restructuring of the facility, including the expansion for hospice, was accomplished with a global grant, but day to day operating expenses are expected to increase. Families are responsible for almost all daily care of the hospice residents. Staff members have been sent to Ensenada and Mexicali for palliative care training. The annual operating costs are approximately \$30,000, so our annual donation remains of critical support importance.

San Felipe Annual Cancer Walk

Annual Cancer Walk will be held February 14th and is the great annual cancer walk/parade in which many of our club members have participated in throughout the years and should not be missed. This event is lots of fun and includes food, music, local culture and service. Driving time down there is about the same as three round trip commutes to San Francisco.

Torsten Jacobsen is happy to announce that the San Felipe Hospice building will be formerally dedicated December 19.




TODAY'S SPEAKER

Lessons from Alcatraz

Program Chair Miles Bell introduced **Bill Arena**, one of our own, who spoke to us today about his experiences participating in the Alcatraz Invitational that covered the physical aspects of year-round training and the personal spiritual benefits of open ocean cold water endurance swimming.

Bill was an original charter member of the Sunrise Rotary club in Arlington, Texas. He moved to California in 2004 and started work as an elementary school teacher in Oakland. Eight months ago he joined our Clayton Valley Sunrise Rotary Club, and spoke to us about his yearly Alcatraz Invitational open ocean swim in San Francisco. Sadly, Bill is moving on as he has another program that cuts into our Thursday morning meetings.



The Alcatraz Invitational is held every fall hosted by the South End Rowing Club, established in 1873. This year's Alcatraz swim had over 600 swimmers, male and female, wetsuits and skins, who made the 1.3 mile crossing from Alcatraz Island to Aquatic Park Cove just adjacent to the Hyde Street Pier. 


LITERACY PROGRAM

DO THE MATH
