


World Polio Day: October 24

Polio(myelitis) has existed for thousands of years but major outbreaks started to occur in the late 19th century in Europe and the United States. In the 20th century it became one of the most fearsome childhood diseases in these locations.

Of the \$1.9 billion Rotary has raised and funded since the mid-1980s, \$885 million has come from the Gates Foundation in the form of matching grants. For the past several years and for the foreseeable

future, the Gates Foundation matches donations raised through Rotary on a two to one basis, such that a \$1 donation becomes \$3 to fight polio.

The Gates Foundation's total giving for the fight against polio was approximately \$3.7 billion through the end of 2018. Roughly a quarter of its polio funding is made in the form of matching grants to Rotary. Together, Rotary and the Gates Foundation represent more than 28% of all polio funding, including funding from governments. Whatever the reasons for the Gates Rotary partnership or its success, the children who will one day live in a world without polio won't much care who gets the credit



Cars 2nd Chance

Mary Kemnitz reported that Christine Laszcz-Davis's daughter donated her 2005 Prius to the Cars 2nd Chance and was so moved by the car donations program that our club gave to the citizens of Paradise that she instructed her share of the profits be donated to the Paradise Project/California Vocations Partnership.

The Prius sold for \$6,400. The split between our club and Christine's daughter was \$1,891—\$2,619 was deducted from the sale price for the cost of conditioning the vehicle and all the other expenses incurred. Christine is a member of the Lamorinda Rotary and last year she donated her 2007Acura MDX.

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Women are Changing the World One Cause at a Time



Mary Kemnitz is calling our attention to Days for Girls the global movement that prepares and distributes sustainable menstrual health solutions to girls who would otherwise miss school during their monthly periods. The nonprofit organization was founded in 2008 by Celeste Mergens, an American

woman. After visiting an orphanage in Nairobi, Kenya, she discovered that menstruating girls stayed in their dormitories for days, sitting on cardboard to absorb their flow, because they could not afford feminine hygiene products. Her

first response was to organize donations of disposable sanitary pads, but she realized that this was clearly not a sustainable solution — and the girls had no way to dispose of used pads. She then developed the idea of creating washable, reusable pads and providing the girls with a personal kit of all they would need to continue their schooling with hygiene and dignity. By 2018, the Kits and health education programs had reached more than one million girls and women in over 100 countries.



sewists" or form "teams," some of which go on to acquire the status of "chapters. These groups have formed in many countries, including Australia, Canada, New Zealand, the United Kingdom, and the United States. Each kit is in a draw-string bag and includes reusable cloth menstrual pads made up of colorful shields and liners; panties; a washcloth and soap; zip-closure plastic bags and other items. The kit enables girls to carry their clean and used pads discreetly and to take care of their own hygiene needs. During the distributions, women and girls also receive health education to break stigmas and cultural taboos associated with menstruation.

In 2012, Days for Girls International launched an Enterprise Program to help local women establish social enterprises to make and distribute kits in their own countries. Close to 70 Days for Girls Enterprises now exist in more than a dozen countries across Ghana, Guatemala, Nepal, Uganda, Asia, and Latin America.




Ken Nishimori spent two days in the Martinez courthouse hoping to get out of jury duty. Happily he wasn't selected and is free for another year.

TODAY'S SPEAKER

Preparing for a Nightmare Scenario

There are any numbers of possible outcomes of a large Bay Area earthquake, and an endless series of scenarios about what could happen, each one contingent upon a combination of factors, including our level of preparedness. Perhaps only one thing is certain: The Bay Area is due—some would say overdue—for a major quake. No one wants to think about such a catastrophe, but one thing is for sure: preparedness is essential. **Torsten Jacobsen**, our speaker today, spoke to us about what we should all have on hand when or if we are hit with the dreaded earthquake. He distributed pamphlets on your family's complete history and supplied us with a list of necessary items to have on hand.



The first aid kit should include:

Sterile water/antiseptic wound wash

H202

Syringe/irrigation bulb

Betadine

Ethyl/benzethonium chloride

Novocain

Antibiotic ointment

Gauze pads/wraps/band aids

Tape

Super glue

Scissors/tweezers

A few other items should also be part of your basic disaster supplies:

Cash

One gallon of water

Wrench/pliers to turn off utilities

Prescription medications

Matches in a waterproof container

Fuel

The 1868 quake killed some 30 people, mostly from building collapses. But at that time Oakland was a town of 12,000 and there were only about 260,000 people living in the entire Bay Area; now there are more than 7 million, more than 2 million of whom live on or near the fault. So take Torsten's advice and **Be Prepared.**
