
A ROTARY MINUTE

THE U.S. BOYS WORKING RESERVE



The year is 1917 and the US has declared war on Germany. Rotary clubs across the country take action in countless ways. **Howard H. Gross**, a member of the Chicago club and



president of the Universal Military Training League has an idea that he pitches to the Chicago Rotarians.

Bolstered by their enthusiastic support, within 24 hours he's sold the idea to the Chicago school board.



His idea?

A virtual army of young men, ages 16 to 20, especially boys in high schools, trading their toy wooden rifles for shovels and hoes heading out to America's farmland. The U.S. Boys Working Reserve was born.





Even **President Wilson** urged the young men to join for the privilege of spending their spare time in productive enterprise to provide for the forces at the front and replace those whose services were needed to home.

The idea spread across the county and whether spraying fruit trees in Pennsylvania, Or picking loganberries in Oregon, the hundreds of thousands of young volunteers



modeled the concept of selfless community service—fitting for an idea contrived by a Rotarian.

Join the PolioPlus Society and donate \$100 each year until the world is Polio free.



TODAY'S SPEAKER



Program Chair Miles Bell introduced us to today's speaker, **Elise Warren**, the as Chief of Police in the City of Clayton. There are two Police Departments in Clayton, serving a population of 11,838 people in an area of 4 square miles. There is one Police Department per 5,919 people, and one Police Department per 1 square miles: The Clayton Police Department at 6000 Heritage Trail, and Marsh

Creek Detention Facility at 12000 Marsh Creek Road. Chief Warren told us that In California, Clayton is ranked 91st of 1,798 cities in Police Departments per capita, and 68th of 1,798 cities in Police Departments per square mile.





In February 2018, she retired from the Sheriff's Office to take her current position as Chief of Police in the City of Clayton. In 2019, Governor Newsom appointed her to the California State 911 Advisory Board.

The Chief holds a Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Executive Certificate, and is a graduate of POST Command College. She is also a member of the California State Police Chief's Association, and the International Chiefs of Police Association. The Chief gave us an overview of the types of crime her officers deal with yearly, and stressed that they are stuck with budget cuts like every other police station,. Keeping up with technology is very hard, and she stressed that application to join the force is down by 30%

ABOUT THE SPEAKER

Chief Elise Warren grew up in Berkeley, and after graduating from high school, she completed her Bachelor of Science degree at Cal Poly State University, San Luis Obispo. She started her career in law enforcement in 1990 with the Contra Costa

County Office of the Sheriff and over the next 28 years at the Sheriff's Office she was, promoted through the ranks and retired as an Assistant Sheriff in 2018. While at the Sheriff's Office she held a variety of positions including, Patrol, Detention, Investigations, Internal Affairs, as well as a variety of administrative positions. Her last two years were spent as the Assistant Sheriff of the Field Operations Bureau, were she oversaw Patrol, Special Operations and Investigations. Chief Warren lives in Walnut Creek and has have been married to Skip for 27 years. They have two children ages 25 and 17. She is a volunteer at the Tony LaRussa Animal Rescue Foundation.


HAPPY/GRUMPY BUCKS


ANOTHER SAD TIME AT OUR CLUB
