


A ROTARY MINUTE

The History of Rotary in 40 Minutes—One Minute at a Time



1921 - A New Name for Rotary






In June, 1921, President **Crawford C. McCullough** led a group of Rotary International past presidents and the president of the Rotary Club of London to a meeting at Buckingham Palace with no less than **King George V**. After Rotary ideals had been explained to King George he is reported to have said:

"I want to see Rotary International spread to every corner of the British Empire."

Later that year, when a committee of

Rotarians met in Chicago to craft various amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of Rotary, someone must have recalled that



interview with King George and asked the question, "Why not change our

name from the International Association of Rotary Clubs to Rotary International?"

KING GEORGE V

The idea caught on and "Rotary International" was written into the Constitution. The name was adopted at the **1922 Convention in Los Angeles**. In light of what has transpired since, many believe that the movement was given impetus and vision by this action.

FOOD BANK UPDATE

Larry Hutchings reported that our Club and the Lamorinda Club are almost ready to present the Food Bank with another \$25,000 check which will bring the total contribution up to \$75,000—that means only \$25,000 will be left to collect to reach our \$100,000 goal. When the next \$25,000 is presented, Larry said that the TV news will be on hand making this a truly phenomenal endeavor.

ECONONIC DATA: Irene Davids-Blair Reporting

Beyond the election, US Bank is also paying close attention to a wide range of economic data and key market indicators. Economic growth remains positive, helped by low interest rates and government stimulus. However, growing coronavirus infections across Europe and the U.S. are risks to growth. China and parts of Asia are leading the economic recovery because coronavirus infections remain well contained.'



- U.S gross domestic product (GDP) for the third quarter came in at 33.1%. leaving U.S. economic activity just 2.9% lower than a year ago.

TODAY'S SPEAKERS

Building Veterans' Self-Understanding through Self-Portraiture







Today's speakers, Victoria Bianco and Reverend Thomas Gutshall, spoke to us about the ABOUTFACE program. it is the Arts and Culture Commission of Contra Costa County's program that works with Veterans throughout the County by offering FREE self-portrait painting classes as a way of saying "Thank you for your service." The program was established in 2015 by the Arts and Culture Commission, the California Arts Council, and the Physical Rehabilitation Service at Veterans Affairs Health Care. ABOUTFACE was developed for the purpose of addressing the needs of veterans and improve their lives through art programming based on the belief that individuals have the capacity to heal themselves through art.

Veronica said, "Many veterans experience some hardships and bumps in the road when transitioning back into civilian life, and they end up

internalizing their feelings. I value connecting with them and sharing the wisdom of self-understanding through self-expression and using my experience to draw out the creative potential from within each one of them."

The three-day ABOUTFACE workshops will be taught virtually by the teaching artist, Veronica, and Veteran coordinator, Jeffrey Geronimo. Interested Veterans and family members are encouraged to participate. No painting experience is necessary. Nothing is being sold, art supplies are provided, and there are no registration fees. ABOUT OUR SPEAKERS

Victoria Bianco is a local artist who has been practicing creative arts in the Bay area her entire adult life. She earned a B.A. from Western Carolina University in North Carolina, a PhD in Philosophy, and was a Residential Artist at More University. Since 2013 she has been working with the Martinez VA Physical Therapy and Rehabilitation Department in the role of teaching artist. Her seven years of experience working in a therapeutic environment gives her a unique perspective of the healing arts. In 2016 she joined the ABOUTFACE Project teaching watercolor painting to hospital patients in a therapeutic atmosphere.

Thomas Gutshall began his love of military as the son of a former WW II Army Engineer. He enlisted in the US Army in 1967, was trained as a photo lab specialist at fort Monmouth New Jersey, and assigned to the photo Signal Battalion field forces in Vietnam 1968. During his tour of duty he was also trained as a combat photographer and had assignments with units from Viet Nam. After He left the military, he began a career with the state Hospital system as a psychiatric technician and retired in 1992. In 1995, he began theological studies and was ordained an Anglican Priest where he served as archdeacon and continues to work with other men and women in recovery.

his first camera when he was 12- years-old with money he earned himself.




KEN NISIMORI gave \$5 happy bucks for Russ Anderson's generous donations to the PolioPlus program.
