A ROTARY MINUTE

Clayton Worsdell Brings You The History of Rotary in 40 Minutes—One Minute at a Time

The Formation of Rotary Districts

Up until 1915 Rotary Clubs acted independently and only came together in exchanges between clubs that were in close proximity, and at national meetings. Then in 1914

H. J. "BRU" BRUNNIER,

H. J. "Bru" Brunnier, President of the Rotary Club of San

Francisco had an idea. (You may recall a recent history minute about Henry's wife, Ann.)

Bru was returning by train from a fellowship gathering of six clubs in Tacoma, WA when he

awakened in the middle of the night with his idea. He summoned a porter to bring him a railroad

schedule of the US which included a map. He placed dots on the map to represent the 100 Rotary clubs and combined them into 13 groupings based on railroad connections.


Bru's map formed the basis upon which Rotary leaders adopted the new district plan at the Rotary Convention of 1915 in San Francisco which

included the use of the title of District Governor for the new leadership model.

Today, there are 530 districts including our own. Rotary District 5160, consists of 73 clubs stretching from San Ramon in the south to Weed in the north and is led by District Governor Mark A Roberts of the Lamorinda Sunrise RC. You can sign up for the 2021 District Conference April 30 ~ May 2, 2021 in Sacramento, CA.



LET'S GET THINGS STARTED

Program Chair Miles Bell introduced speakers: Cherise Khaund, Aaron Levy, and James Monroe.

TODAY'S SPEAKERS



Cherise Khaund, Aaron Levy, and **James Monroe** spoke to us about the **MDUSD Education Foundation**, a new nonprofit dedicated to funding quality education for ALL students in the Mt Diablo School District, that deals with virtual learning.

Mt. Diablo Unified School District has pivoted completely to digital learning during shelter-in-place. More than 4,500 Chromebook have been checked out to students with lessons delivered via zoom and other platforms. Mt. Diablo Unified School District's



teachers and administrators have been working hard to provide access to technology for all students so that remote learning may take place during this pandemic.



To support this effort, the foundation has created the Coronavirus Remote Learning Fund. Every dollar contributed to this fund will go toward the acquisition and distribution of distance learning technologies that can be used both now and in the future. Access to a computer and the Internet are key to successful remote learning. While many of our students have access to both in their home, as many as 20% of our student population does not. In anticipation of campus closures, teachers checked out and distributed Chromebooks to many students, but there are not nearly enough to support the learning needs of our diverse district

Cherise began her four year term on the MDUSD school board in December 2018. From 2017-18 she was the President and one of the Founders of the MDUSD Education Foundation the nonprofit dedicated to funding quality education for ALL students in Mt Diablo School District and started tutoring programs for parents who don't speak English and has done everything from running a reading program for struggling students in 10 schools in Concord and Bay Point.

James spoke about the MOSA Mack program: Science Detective is a web-based series of short, animated science mysteries designed to inspire 4th - 8th graders. Utilizing a fun, diverse cast of characters, each episode examines a science topic using an inquiry-model and ends with a query the students attempt to solve together using customizable discussion guides and strives to expose all students to the thrill of problem-solving while empowering girls and children



of color in science. Aaron, James, and Cherise are passionate about education and believe the best decisions are made when teachers, parents, and community members come together to find the best solutions for all students and is dedicated to advocating educational opportunities for all students. WINE TASTING EVENT



The Wine Tasting, that **Director Larry Hutchings** organized, took place via zoom this past Sunday; in virtual attendance were Larry, Dennis, Bill Selb, Vicki, John, Bob Sundberg, Barbara, and Joan D'Onofrio. Joan, by the way, was the self-appointed designated driver so she did not partake. When they reminded her that they were all



already home, she suggested that they might need her to get them from their kitchen to their bedrooms.

Each Rotarian had three bottles to imbibe that consisted of the Landmark Vineyard's Chardonnay Demaris 2017, Pinot Noir Grand Detour Sonoma Coast 2017, and Pinot Noir Hop Kiln Vineyards Russian River 2018. A brief slide show was narrated by Olivia Laney, the events coordinator who outlined the history of the Landmark Vineyards. The Vineyards' roots stretch all the way back to 1838 and it was in Grand Detour, Illinois of that year that John Deere invented the steel plow – an event that virtually revolutionized the business of agriculture. In 1989, John Deere's great-great granddaughter, following the family tradition in agriculture, relocated Landmark Vineyards from Illinois, to a spectacular piece of land at the base of Sugarloaf Mountain in the Sonoma Valley. She believed that Landmark could be a small jewel of a winery with state-of-the-art winemaking equipment that will be able to produce 20,000 cases of wine per year.

Landmark's philosophy and guiding principle is that the best grapes make the best wines, and, as a result, they have been able to create wines that receive high ratings among critics and wine lovers alike. Olivia said, "Landmark's wines have consistently garnered rave reviews from the wine writers Robin Parker, Karen McNeill, and the San Francisco Chronicles' tasting panel. Their signature wine, the Overlook Chardonnay and Grand Detour Pinot Noir, have appeared on The Wine Spectator 's top 100 list 7 times since 1997."
